

THE DIXIE IV. WINNER IN FIRST RACE FOR MOTOR BOAT CHAMPIONSHIP.

START OF THE RACE FOR THE BRITISH INTERNATIONAL CUP.



Splitting the waters of Hamilton Bay, the American motor boat Dixie IV, won the first race for the International Motor Boat Cup, the Harmsworth trophy, completing the thirty mile course in fifty minutes.

The British contender, the Pioneer, was second; the Viva was third and the Disturber, another American entry, was fifth, while the two other English entries dropped out, the Maple Leaf III, in the second lap and the Typhoon II, in the third.

These were winning the first two races of the cup. Therefore, should an American boat come home the winner in the next race the much coveted trophy will remain on this side.
