**May Erect Monument.**  
There is a movement on foot in the West End to erect a monument in memory of Sidney Fulton, the boy who heroically lost his life on Thursday afternoon last at Lingley when he jumped into the water without a moment's hesitation to save his mother's life. A number of persons have volunteered to save the life of his companion, William Collen. Being a good swimmer young Fulton would not have saved Collen's life had not the latter grabbed him by the arm and neck with the result that both were drowned.

**Made Life Member.**  
Dr. Boyle Travers was the recipient of an unusual honor at the last meeting of the New Brunswick Medical Society, which elected an honorary life member of the section. Dr. Travers has been a member of the medical profession for an unusually long time, and the election of his fellow practitioners was taken as only a mark of their personal esteem and as a recognition of his length of service. In accepting the honor Dr. Travers made a speech in which he related some of his experiences as a doctor in the early days, and contrasting conditions as present prevailing with those existing when he first began his career.

**A Surprise Package.**

A bundle which appeared as though it had been wired for safety lay in it, was found in front of the Union Depot yesterday about 8 o'clock in the morning by Patrick Gorman, an official at the station. Policeman Shortliffe was called and the package handed over to him. It was believed at first that it contained dynamite, but the presumption that it would be dangerous to come in contact with it, they did not at first care to handle the bundle. Finally it was lifted up and examined. Since the wires and safety blankets were unrolled and the fuses were surprised to find within nothing more than an old suit case in which were plain clothing clothes. Their mistake is to the credit of the contents of the bundle, however, was gladly welcomed by them.

SAD DROWNING IN HARBOR  
EARLY SUNDAY MORNING

**Martin Frederickson Thrown from Tug Springhill by Swerving of Hawser, Failed to Come to the Surface—Dragged with Grappling Irons in Hunt for Body, but Without Avail.**

Before the night of Sunday had dawned upon the city and when the Sabbath had just begun, the stillness of the early morn about the waterfront was interrupted by the shouting of "man overboard," and Martin Frederickson, deck hand on the tug Springhill and innately vain, leaped into the waters at the end of the boat. He shouted to the mate. "The victim of the accident followed the advice of the mate but before he had run far enough to clear himself of the rope for some unknown reason he halted and caught him, the mate dashed him to the deck.

In the fall it is thought that the unfortunate man was stunned by striking his head against the railing of the tug as he plunged into the water and struggled or effort to reach the shore.

About 2:30 yesterday morning Frederickson was in the employ of the Dominion Coal Company, which

was towing out the harbor the coal

and was preparing to make the sail to Parrsboro, N. S. Frederickson

was standing on the stern of the tug when the hawser connecting the vessel was severed at the end of the boat forcing him to the deck.

The unfortunate man grasped the rope and tried to cling to it. But moving over the side of the tug the hawser twisted and became entangled with the mate, who was unable to free himself.

Frederickson was then towed into the water by the mate and George Ramsey was all that was heard and he sank beneath the waves without the slightest resistance towards the surface.

The mate then towed the vessel away from the scene of the accident.

After cruising the surrounding waters for some time the tug pulled in to search for the body.

**Search for Body.**

Simon Anderson and Wilfred Bettis conducted a search for a body yesterday afternoon. A searching party will scour the harbor waters again today.

Frederickson was a strong undercurrent in the harbor and it is believed that much difficulty will be experienced in recovering his remains.

It is believed that the man was destined to meet his death by drowning. Only four weeks ago, after twice sinking beneath the waters at Miapsea, he was rescued from a watery grave. He was bathing at the time when a sudden pull brought him beneath the water, but when going down the third time he was with difficulty saved by a passing boat.

The deceased, who was 25 years old, was a young wife and a young wife of a father, two brothers and three sisters none of whom reside in St. John.
