Brookville, Ont., Mar. 18.—Miss Margaret Moreland, wife of Nat Goodwin, the comedian, following a performance, narrowly escaped choking to death in an attempt to swallow a capsule of castor oil. Mrs. Goodwin was suffering from a bad cold and at her room in the hotel sought to relieve it by medicine. The capsule stuck in her throat and caused her to choke. A nurse who happened to be in the hotel, rendered first aid until the arrival of a doctor. On account of her illness the Brookville date, billed for to night, was cancelled. This afternoon she was able to leave with the company for Ottawa.

PRE-NUPTIAL AGREEMENT
BETWEEN LORD CAMOYS
AND WIFE IS FILED

Transfers Lady Comay's Entire Estate to Trustees—She is to Receive Income Until Thirty-five Years Old.

Providence, R. I., Mar. 18.—A pre-nuptial agreement made by Ralph Francis Julia Stoner, Lord Camoys of Henley on the Thames, England, and Miss Mildred Constance Sherman, daughter of Mrs. Wm. W. Sherman of Newport, who were married about a year ago, was filed with the Recorder of Deeds here today. The agreement transfers all the estate, and property of Lady Camoys to the control of two trustees, Frank W. Matteson and Fletcher S. Mason of this city, and provides that the income shall be paid her until she becomes thirty-five years old. If she died before the age of thirty-five, Lord Camoys is to be paid \$100,000 for his absolute use. If children are left, Lord Camoys is to receive the income from \$100,000 for the remainder of his life and the children, equal shares of the remaining estate upon reaching the age of twenty-one. If the wife should die before the age of thirty-five and leaves no will or children, the property residue will go to her sister, Mrs. Lawrence D. Gillespie.

Powers, 24 Pearl street, Toronto, pleaded guilty today in the county police court to a charge of rifling the mail and an alleged companion in crime, Wm. Easton, No. 2 Erie terrace, 19 years of age, is in Grace Hospital with a bullet wound in his right leg. The wound was received while the two were fleeing from constables this morning after the Mimico post office had been robbed. In the plunder found on the pair who admitted guilt was a cheque for \$25 belonging to Miss M. C. Burgess, of Mimico.

PRETTY RUSSIAN GIRL
ON TRIAL IN VIENNA
FOR PLAYING SPY

Vienna, March 18.—The second stage of the attempt to unravel the alleged extensive Russian espionage campaign in Austria was opened today by the Austrian government.

Nine Russian subjects were placed on trial before the Provincial Court on accusations of being in the employ of the Russian general staff for the purpose of ferreting out Austrian military secrets, especially in regard to Galicia, where the Austrian and Russian frontiers coincide.

The accused Russians are all civilians. They include two women, one of whom, Nora Baron, is youthful and very attractive, and is alleged to have succeeded in obtaining much information from susceptible officers at Lemberg.

The first stage in the campaign against spying in Austria was marked by the suicide of Colonel Alfred Redl, chief of the general staff of the Eighth Austrian army corps, whose headquarters were at Prague. He shot himself last May after his treason had been discovered, and it was stated at the time that he had received from the authorities an opportunity of taking his own life instead of being brought to trial.

BEFORE CAUCUS

More Opposition to Project Than Was at First Anticipated.

NO PROPOSAL MADE
BY THE GOVERNMENT.

Difficult to Determine Final Outcome of the Matter—No Immediate Action Seems Probable.

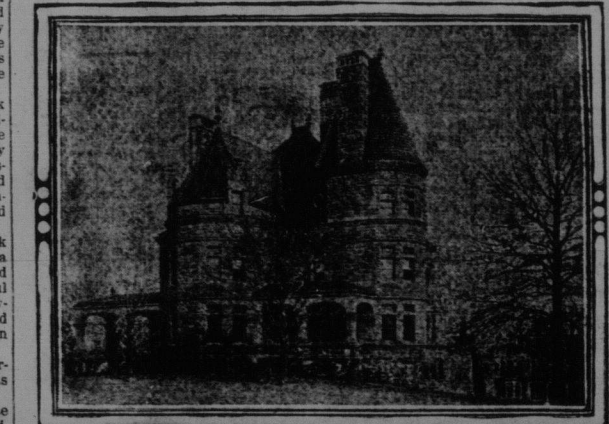
Ottawa, March 18.—No man knows what action will be taken by the Conservative party regarding the application for a government guarantee of bonds. This is now one of the leading members of the Conservative party described the situation this evening as the result of the caucus which was held today to discuss the matter. "Of course time heals and it may be that the temper of many of the members regarding the Canadian Northern may change as time goes on," he added.

Another member stated to The Standard that there was a disposition on the part of some of the party to take over the Canadian Northern, but he himself could not see how this would be possible in view of the fact that it was a federal corporation. In a few years the government would find the National Transcontinental railway from Montreal to Winnipeg on its hands, and it would be an impossible proposition to handle two transcontinental systems.

The facts about the caucus are, so far as The Standard was able to ascertain from a number of prominent Conservatives that more opposition to giving governmental assistance to the Canadian Northern developed than had been anticipated.

The government made no proposal to the caucus but simply laid before it the application of the C. N. R. The war was on at once and hard things were said about the Canadian Northern magnates, Sir William Mackenzie and Sir Donald Mann, and their method of financing their ventures in other lines of activity other than railway building and the question of the assets they would be prepared to place with the government if a decision was arrived at to guarantee a further issue of bonds.

The government also in the caucus who saw in the present difficulties of the Canadian Northern and the possibility of the railway becoming insolvent, a national danger in the upturning of the credit abroad in Canadian undertakings from the national standpoint.

"FELLOWES' FOLLY," BUILT AT COST
OF \$110,000, IS SOLD FOR \$500

A handsome residence of Scotch red sandstone, with red Spanish tile roof, which cost \$110,000 to build, was sold to wreckers for \$500. The sale is the sequel to the aspirations of the late Colonel William Fellowes for a palatial home where he expected to live with his wife and daughter in happiness the rest of their lives, but reverses in the cotton market blasted the hope just before its consummation.

After \$110,000 had been spent on the structure and before it was completed, when Colonel Fellowes' large fortune was tied up in "bubbling" the market, cotton suddenly slumped. Colonel Fellowes went South for his health and in a short time died. Creditors took over the estate, and the building never was finished nor occupied, except by the caretaker. The structure soon became known as "Fellowes' Folly."

The actual figures with all polls heard from give Hon. J. A. Tessier 1792 and J. A. Desy 1516, a majority for the new minister of 276. The old lists had 3,043 names and the new one 3,350, of which about 84 per cent. voted. The majority is seven less than that recorded for Tessier in 1912.
