

# BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE WELL PROVISIONED AND IN GOOD HEALTH, KITCHENER REPORTS

## War Secretary Pleased With Success of The Recruiting Campaign

London, April 22.—The recruiting results of the last few months have been most satisfactory and gratifying, was the statement delivered in the House of Commons this afternoon by War Secretary Kitchener by Harold J. Tennant, parliamentary secretary of the war office. "Month by month the stream of new men has been maintained with amazing regularity," Mr. Tennant said, "and when the time comes to call for still more men, I am confident the nation will respond with the same readiness, decision and promptness as it has responded in the past."

Mr. Tennant made these remarks while speaking on the armistice. He referred in glowing terms to the supply services of the army and the health of the troops at the front, mentioning incidentally that there was not a single case of dysentery among the men. Large additions had been made to the aerial service since the beginning of the war, Mr. Tennant continued. He believed the danger threatened from spotted fever had been overcome, and he paid particular stress on the importance Lord Kitchener attached to a limitless supply of artillery ammunition.

## SHIPPING TO AND FROM HOLLAND IS SUSPENDED

No ships will leave Great Britain for Netherlands for the present.

Bulletin—Amsterdam, via London, April 22.—The following official statement was issued here today in behalf of the British government: "All shipping between Holland and the United Kingdom is stopped for the time being. No ships will leave the United Kingdom for Holland after today. Ships from Holland will not be admitted to the United Kingdom after today. It is hoped shortly to resume limited cargo and passenger traffic. Special arrangements have been made for the transfer of mails."

## KAISER VISITS BATTLEGROUND IN ALSACE

Geneva, April 22, via Paris, 2.45 p. m.—Emperor William, during the last few days, has been visiting the German battlefield in Alsace. Near Muelhausen His Majesty reviewed the Prussian Guard which fought at Hartmannsweilerkopf, and from Colmar he visited the trenches. At Strasbourg, the Emperor promoted Colonel Reuter, of Zabern, to the rank of major-general. The Emperor held no receptions, and the newspapers were prohibited from mentioning the movements of the Imperial party. Trains arriving at Basel from Germany since yesterday are many hours late. French aviators have seriously damaged the main railroad line near Strasbourg.

The German government has transported 2,200 more French maimed officers and men to Constance, where they are waiting to be exchanged for German wounded. Then they will return to France, by way of Switzerland.

At the annual general meeting of the National Federation of Meat Traders' Associations, held in London, it was stated that an examination by chartered accountants showed that in respect of 120 shops of every class of the butchers' trade the average percentage of net profit was only 3.2 per cent.

## German Property Held By Public Trustee in England \$425,000,000

London, April 22.—The estimated value of German property in Great Britain now in the custody of the Public Trustee was given in the House of Commons this afternoon as in the neighborhood of \$425,000,000. Russell Rea, who, on behalf of the Board of Trade, gave these figures, in response to a question from Lord Charles Beresford, assured the questioner that these German assets will be available for such disposal as seems proper on the conclusion of peace. Lord Beresford's suggestion was that Englishman owning property in Germany should recoup out of this fund, and that £1,000 daily should be confiscated for every British officer subjected to ill-treatment while a prisoner in Germany.

## HON. MR. MEIGHAN CRITICISES POLICY OF PRES. WILSON

Ottawa, April 22.—Addressing the Laurentian Club here, Hon. Arthur Meighan, Solicitor-General for Canada, offered sharp criticism of the policy of President Wilson toward the war, declaring that the United States appeared to care more for party politics and dollars and cents than for the principles of justice and freedom and the cause of humanity.

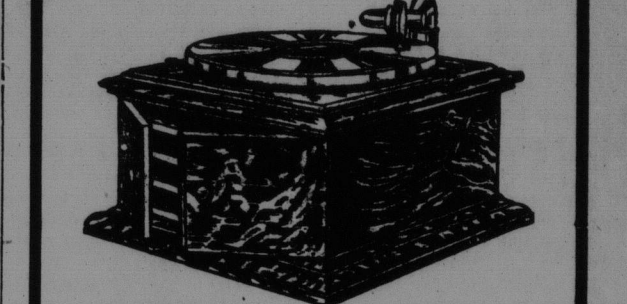
**Flour Advances in Price.**

## SEVEN MILLION POLES IN DIRE NEED OF FOOD

Over 2,000,000 are Jews—Living on garbage in parts of Poland evacuated by Germans.

London, April 22 (6.30 p.m.)—Seven million Poles, of whom two million are Jews, are in dire need of food. This statement was made today by Hermann Landau, a prominent Jewish philanthropist, associated with various Jewish charities in London. "Of these sufferers, 5,500,000 are east of the Vistula river, and 1,500,000 west of the river," Mr. Landau said. "The Jews are even poorer than the Gentiles, because of the boycott against the Jews in parts of Poland before the beginning of the war, which impoverished thousands who otherwise would have been able to provide for their families."

"Political and religious prejudice against the Jews renders their condition worse than that of the Catholics. In parts of Poland, evacuated by the Germans many Jews are living on potato peels and garbage left by the army. The Catholic population has been able to flee beyond Warsaw in much larger numbers than the Jews. "The citizens' committee at Warsaw is the only large agency for affording relief for refugees. Although the membership of this committee consists of four Jews and six Gentiles it has been impossible to employ workers who would deal fairly with the Jews. Consequently another committee has been organized, under the chairmanship of Baron Gunzberg, to administer relief without regard to religious faith."

"Several hundred refugees from Poland who are well-to-do made their way to London by way of Petrograd, Finland, Sweden and Norway. They brought terrible stories of the sufferings of Poles in the ruined cities and devastated country."

"Where relief is provided for the Poles, the daily allowance to each person is only an amount equivalent to four cents, which is barely enough to keep the people alive in a country where prices are high. It is difficult to obtain food at any price."

"The Russian government has been considerate in its treatment of Jews in the portions of Poland occupied by Russian troops, but the Jews are suffering greatly from persecution in the portion of Galicia which Austria still holds, as Austria suspects all Poles of disloyalty."

"Baroness Benckendorff, wife of the Russian ambassador at London, and Baron Doherty, Russian Consul General at London, have given liberally to aid the Polish sufferers. The Poles in London are chiefly poor Jews, but they are giving freely from their small means. In one night I received \$250, entirely in pennies, from Polish Jews in London."

"I hear that Americans are rallying to aid the Poles, and I know that their needs will be supplied when the world realizes how terrible is their plight. Communication with Poland and Galicia is so difficult that it is impossible for the world to learn immediately of the awful suffering there. But a good cause never lacks supporters, and I feel sure the world will rally to the aid of the Polish sufferers, as you Americans did to the cry of the Belgians."

## NOT YET DECIDED TO CONFISCATE GERMAN SHIPS

No action taken by British Gov't on suggestion that interned enemy ships be seized.

London, April 22.—Great Britain has not yet decided to act on the suggestion to confiscate interned German and Austrian ships in retaliation for every British merchant ship sunk by a German submarine.

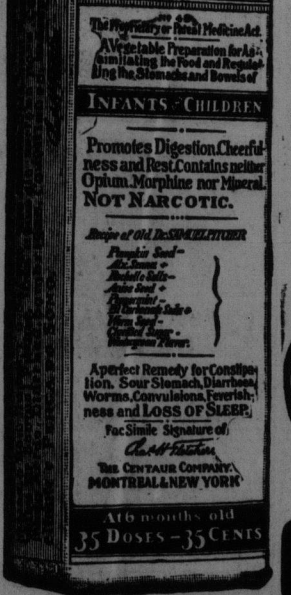
Frederic Asquith, answering a question in the House of Commons this afternoon put by Lord Charles Beresford, added to the foregoing that this decision did not preclude reconsideration of the matter should things demand it.

Foreign Secretary Grey told anxious members of the House of Commons this afternoon that the Japanese government has been specifically informed of the concessions granted British subjects in China. He explained this action was taken so that in the Chinese-Japanese negotiations the existing British railroad concessions could not be injured by new concessions granted to Japan.

The Foreign Secretary added he had no doubt Japan would respect any rights already acquired.

**AT HALIFAX.**

Three Norwegian barks arrived at Halifax on the 20th to load lumber. They are the Valdivia, Angelo and Lalla Rookh. The Valdivia sailed from Sharpness and encountered rough weather during almost the whole of the trip of 35 days. The Angelo from Newport, Wales, was 54 days on the voyage. The Lalla Rookh is from Christiania and was 31 days out.
