A few days since the fact was noticed, that a colored male infant had been left on the door-step of the house of a man named Allison, living on Albion Street. The mother of the child proves to be a colored woman, a widow named Margaret Bruce. She was arrested and says that Allison is the father of the child, and that she was sent to the poor house to nurse the child until she can make the father aware of his duty. She is now obliged to her father to support it. — *Halifax Recorder.*

The death of David Frederick Strassas, at the age of 64, deprives the extreme German free-thinkers of their most respectable and persistent defender. Strassas was for more than thirty years stood in the position of the champion of ultra materialism pure and simple, as antagonistic to the faith and dogmas of every religion of Christendom. He was regarded, when his "Life of Jesus" appeared, as the most outspoken of modern French philosophical sceptics; but in his controversy with Strassas he was, compared with that philosopher, a child of the world. He has just been able to read, in the "Liberator," the following words: "The German philosopher of the last century was the reason that led to his learning, what and a course which the most terrible conclusions do not deny, that he was not only a philosopher, but a man of letters, and that his own theories result in materialism as the only philosophy he asserted in a book with a title and a reputation which he has earned, and which he has not lost." — *Halifax Recorder.*

The Rev. Chas. Kingsley, the poet, novelist and historian, now in New York, has been asked his opinion on the dissolution of Parliament and the political situation in England, and he replied: "The dissolution of Parliament was not unexpected, and it is not particularly significant. It indicates no reaction from liberal ideas, and it is better for Mr. Gladstone to retire now, when his greatest influence is at the highest, than to remain and risk a possible fall in the future. The Liberal cause is so firmly established that it will survive any change of government."

Even the Conservatives of England are Liberal at heart, and, on the other hand, the Liberals are Conservative at heart. In other words, there are no essential differences between the two parties, and the only real difference is in the degree of their conservatism.

A special despatch from Cincinnati says that at Waynesville an order was issued by Mayor Dodson to the Marshal requiring him to disperse all bands of women found congregating in the streets or on the sidewalks. He declares his intention to have no more sidewalk or saloon prayer meetings in his village, and the ladies, backed by the money of many temperance people, no less determinedly evince the intention to hold just as many meetings and offer as many prayers as they think proper. One old humor dealer named Frandy, in that place, is keeping a strict account of the time the women occupy his premises for prayer, and purposes to prosecute them for damages, they visit him daily, however, and for him they are offering fervent prayers.
