HEDLEY SHAW MILL TO COMMENCE FLOUR PRODUCTION IN FEW DAYS,

Medicine Hat, Alta., December 9.—The wheels in the new Hedley Shaw flour mills here—an industry that will have cost between \$400,000 and \$500,0.0 when in full operation—have been turned over for the first

For the next week or two the entire equipment of the mill will be operated to get everything in smooth running order, and so that adjustments, if necessary, may be made by the mechanics installing the many machines for the numerous operations necessary to the turning out of high grade flour.
