WRECK OF CASARCO NO. 3.

Casarco No. 3, the first of the fleet of fourteen gasoline craft built for the Canadian Sardinia Co. of Chamcook, on the St. Croix, has been lost off the Maine coast while carrying a cargo of cured fish from one of the lower Bay of Fundy islands to a Maine port. The lost boat was valued at \$7,000, the entire fleet costing \$88,000. The crew was saved. The vessel had been used during the summer to carry mails from the Bay Islands to Eastport and along the St. Croix. She also was engaged in the passenger and freight trade. The boat is the first of the valuable fleet to meet with a mishap of consequence. When the company became embarrassed three years ago the fleet was sold at a sacrifice. —Standard.
