Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or asy male over 18 years old, may home stead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at asy Dominion Lands Agency (out not Sub-Agency,) on certain conditions.

Lands Agency (out not Sub-Agency,) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of the least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

Asettler who has exhausted his home-slead right may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 pe acre. Duties—Must reside six month out of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The arc of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or tony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions
