FIGHT ABOUT TO BEGIN

Correspondent With Jap General
Oku Points Fact Out.

Port Arthur Still Held By the Russians
Though Japanese Have Captured Im-
portant Positions That Give Them the
Command of the East Side of the For-
tress Whenever They Decide to Press
Their Advantage.

London, Nov. 4.—The Daily Tele-
graph's correspondent with General
Oku, under date of Nov. 2, says that
the indications are that a terrific en-
gagement is about to commence.

Attack On Oct. 26.
Port Arthur, Nov. 4.—It was an-
nounced on Oct. 25 that the follow-
ing day would be a bombardment of
the fortified ridge, and also the Chair
Hill forts, to be followed by infantry
attacks for the capture of the trench
lines and glacis of the East and
West Urt forts, the East and South
Keekwan forts, with demonstrations
on either flank. After a bombard-
ment a regiment emerged from paral-
lels at the foot of the East Urt fort.

Another regiment of the right divi-
sion left the parallels at the foot of
the West Urt fort simultaneously,
under cover of a tremendous fire of
shrapnel. When the first regiment
gained the trenches at the crest of
the glacis of East Urt fort the Rus-
sians exploded a mine. Pieces of
timber, earth, stones and some Rus-
sians were hurled hundreds of feet.
Trench lines on both hills were cap-
tured with 500 casualties.

Early on October 27 the Russians
made sorties on the Japanese trench-
es near the West Urt forts and
Hachihakayama. The Japanese casu-
alties were 300. The Russians left
60 dead.

The same night the Russians made
four sorties against the captured
trenches of the West Urt forts. The
Japanese casualties were 120. Rus-
sians left 20 dead.

PORT ARTHUR IS FALLING.

Japanese Now Occupy Positions Which
Place the East Side of the Fortress
At Their Mercy.

Che Foo, Nov. 4.—Port Arthur is
doomed. The correspondent of the
Associated Press here has received
information, the reliability of which
is beyond question, that the Japan-
ese now occupy positions which place
the east side of the town at their
mercy. The last assault has gained
for them positions which ensure their
ability to enter the main east forts
whenever they are ready.

A censored despatch from the As-
sociated Press correspondent with the
Japanese army does not give any
particulars of a general engagement
going on at Port Arthur, but it is
certain that it occurred and that
some forts were captured. Terrific
explosions heard here indicate that
the Russians have exploded mines
and destroyed other property.

The Japanese calculate that if the
Russians do not surrender now they
will be capable of prolonging fighting
by making their final stand at
Liotti Promontory and Tiger's Tail
for a month longer with the hope
of continuing the struggle.

The Japanese have not occupied
the main forts and highest points of
the east hills, but they occupy in
overwhelming numbers positions
which will enable them to drive the
Russians back whenever they desire.
When the Japanese occupy the east
ridge they will completely dominate
the other Russian forts with their
artillery.

Japanese arriving from Dalny to-
day report that the Japanese have
captured Rihlung Mountain and
Sungshu Mountain, which lies be-
tween the railroad and Rihlung
Mountain.

Beginning of the End.
Headquarters of the Third Japan-
ese Army, in Front of Port Arthur,
Nov. 2, by way of Che Foo, Nov. 3.

The Japanese are now in a position
to commence the beginning of
the operations to capture the
eastern fortified ridges. Their siege
park has been completed by the plac-
ing of 11-inch Howitzers. During the
night of Oct. 29 all the reserves ad-
vanced through a network of trench-
es in front of the eastern fortified
ridges from south of Keekwan to
west of Keekwan and to the west of
Rihlung Mountain, called by the Ja-
panese Shochosen.

The bombardment began at dawn
Oct. 30, and infantry attacks were
planned at noon against Rihlung
Mountain, an entrenched hill be-
tween the east of Banjusan and the
east of Keekwan and on three Keek-
wan forts.

There is tremendous excitement
among the troops, who are convinced
of success and mean to capture the
fortified ridges and compel the sur-
render of Port Arthur in time for the
Mikado's birthday, Nov. 3.

Licence of the Attack.
The Japanese attack on the Rus-
sian redoubts at Rihlung Mountain
was marked by a desperate valor not
exceeded during any part of the
siege. Repeated charges on the de-
fenders' trenches were made until 5
o'clock in the evening, when two
companies of Japanese captured the
vast Banjusan Fort at the point of
the bayonet.

During the night a Japanese regi-
ment assaulted and captured part of
the South Keekwan fort, and on the
following night a general assault
was made. Time after time as the
Japanese approached the Russian
searchlights flashed out and the be-
siegers' lines were swept away by a
storm of bullets from quick-firing
guns. The Japanese, however, finally
succeeded in establishing them-
selves in a favorable position.

Gen. Suetsugu Wounded.
London, Nov. 4.—A despatch to a
news agency from St. Petersburg
says Lieut.-Gen. Suetsugu, commander
of the Russian troops at Port Ar-

thor, is reported to be wounded in
the leg.

The Mikado's Birthday.
Tokio, Nov. 4.—Japan enjoyed a
holiday yesterday in honor of the
Emperor's birthday. Ordinarily the
people idolize their sovereign, but
the war seems to have increased their
affection. The celebration was
observed throughout the Empire.
The cities were decorated and patri-
otic exercises were held. At Tokio
the Emperor reviewed the fleet and
the Imperial Guard's Division and
gave a luncheon at the palace for
the higher officials and foreign di-
plomats.
