WAS ACCIDENTAL

Inquest into the Cause of the Death of the Late Thos. Colby of Wallaceburg

Crown Attorney H. D. Smith has returned from Wallaceburg, where he attended, in behalf of the Crown, the inquest into the cause of the death of the late Thomas Colby, who was reported burned to death.

The inquest was held by Dr. Mitchell, of that place, and the evidence went to show that death was caused by the deceased going to bed while in the state of intoxication, and, in trying to light his pipe, set fire to the bedclothes.

Deceased was a man about 70 years of age and lived with a man named McLean. He was a laborer and an old resident of Wallaceburg. The house was completely destroyed by the fire. The family slept down stairs, and the deceased's room was up stairs. When the fire was noticed, an effort was made to rescue Mr. Colby, but it was found impossible. The body could hardly be recognized. It was so badly burned.

At the present time there is a man waiting to be tried for assaulting the deceased man. It is claimed that Colby was struck with an axe on the head some time ago. The case comes off in June. It was shown however, that the man who is charged with the assault had nothing to do with the present case. On the day that the fire happened Colby went to the bank and drew out all of his money, and when he was found he had no money on him. It was brought out, however, that he gave his money to a bartender to keep for him, and it was also proven who took him home the night in question.
