LLOYD GEORGE IS HEAD OF THE NEW BRITISH CABINET

London, Jan. 11.—New British Cabinet will be headed by David Lloyd George as Premier and First Lord of the Treasury, according to an official statement issued Friday night. Other members of the Government will be: Lord of the Privy Seal and Leader in the House of Commons, Andrew Bonar Law; President of the Council and Leader in the House of Lords, Earl Curzon; Ministers without Portfolio, George Nicoll Barnes and Sir Eric Geddes.

Lord Chancellor, Sir F. E. Smith; Home Secretary, Edward Shortt; Under Secretary, Hamer Greenwood; Foreign Secretary, Arthur J. Balfour; Under Secretary, Cecil Bishop Harmsworth; Secretary for Colonies, Viscount Milner; Secretary of War and of Air Ministry (which has been combined), Winston Spencer Churchill; Under Secretary, Viscount Peel; Financial Secretary of the War Office, Henry W. Foster; Secretary for India, Edwin S. Montague; Under Secretary, Sir S. H. Sinha; First Lord of the Admiralty, Walter Hume Long; Parliamentary Secretary, Thomas J. McNamara; President of the Board of Trade, Sir Albert Stanley; Under Secretary, W. E. Bridgeman.

Department of Overseas Trade Development and Intelligence; Sir Arthur Steel-Maitland, who is also appointed additional Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs and additional Parliamentary Secretary Board of Trade.

President of the Local Government Board, Dr. Christopher Addison; Parliamentary Secretary, Stephen Walsh (Labourite); Secretary of Agriculture, R. E. Prothero; Minister of Education, H. A. L. Fisher; Secretary of the Ministry of Munitions, which is to become eventually Ministry of Supplies, Andrew Weir; Food Controller, George H. Roberts; Minister of Shipping, Sir J. P. MacLay; Minister of Labor, Sir Robert Stevenson; Home Minister for Pensions, Sir Laming Worthington-Evans; Minister of National Service and Reconstruction, Sir Geddes Lanchester; Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, Earl of Crawford; First Commissioner of Works, Sir Alfred Mond; Attorney General, Sir Gordon Hewart; Solicitor General, Albert Holden Kingsworth; Paymaster General, Sir Joseph Dempston-Rickett; Chancellor of the Exchequer, Austen Chamberlain.

Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, General Viscount French; Chief Secretary for Ireland, Sir James Ian MacPherson; Secretary for Scotland, Robert Munro.

Both Prothero and Andrew Weir were raised to the peerage on accepting their new offices.

It is announced that until there has been more time to make permanent peace arrangements, the existing War Cabinet will be continued.

The Government intends to submit to parliament proposals for the establishment of a Ministry of Ways and Communications. If these are adopted, Sir Eric Geddes will be invited to head the new department.

BRANDON SENIOR TEAM SCORES 14-1 AGAINST THE 'FRAGMENTS FROM FRANCE'

Brandon senior hockey team registered another victory at the Arena Friday night, defeating the Tuxedo Hospital team (Fragments from France), by a score of fourteen to one. The visitors, who were outclassed in all departments, showed flashes of brilliancy, but could not keep up the fast clip set by the Brandon boys. Notwithstanding the one-sided score the teams furnished considerable excitement for the seven hundred spectators as the visitors put up a much better argument than the score would indicate, particularly in the second period when they held the home team down to two tallies and registered their lone count. Superb goal tending by Prof. Evans of Brandon College, who took Winkler's place prevented the Tuxedo boys from scoring on several occasions. McNeill and Coldwell starred for the home team and were well supported on the forward line by Creighton, also by R. Mummy who substituted. Hay and Loughlin were the pick of the visitors, the former executing some fine end to end rushes. Owing to the visitors being short of substitutes three twenty minute periods were played instead of the regulation two half-hour periods.

WILL LLOYD GEORGE RULE CABINET OR WILL CABINET RULE PREMIER?

Conservative Members of Cabinet Occupy High Places—Four Years Ago They Regarded Lloyd George as Conservatives Today Regard Bolsheviks—Will Land Owning Interests Agree To Reforms Premier Promised?

London, Jan. 11.—The new Cabinet of Lloyd George was announced Friday night. It presents few surprises. The question the British newspapers are asking is whether Lloyd George will rule the Cabinet or whether his Conservative advisors will dominate him.

A majority of the members of the Cabinet in high places are Conservatives, notably Bonar Law, Earl Curzon, Balfour and Viscount Milner. Only four years ago their party regarded Lloyd George, as Conservatives today regard the Bolsheviks.

The Premier is pledged by his campaign speech, to a number of sweeping reforms, the giving of land and houses to workmen and discharged soldiers. His principal advisers are regarded as representatives of land owning interest, who following tradition would place barriers in the way of such reforms. The Ministers without portfolio, George Nichol Barnes and Sir Eric Geddes, have important duties for which there are no Cabinet places.

Barnes will represent labor at the Paris Peace Conference while Sir Eric has undertaken the management of demobilization. One innovation is the selection for the first time of an Indian as member of the Government, Sir H. H. Sinha, having the place of Under Secretary for India.

Another is appointment of Cecil Bishop Harmsworth, brother of Lord Northcliffe, to succeed Lord Robert Cecil as Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs.

NEW YORK BOAT OWNERS AND MEN IN FIGHT TO FINISH

Owners Declare They Will Never Yield to Demand For Eight Hour Day

16,000 MEN IDLE

Harbor Completely Tied Up—Industries and Transportation Lines Are Without Coal

New York, Jan. 11.—No hope of an early settlement of the strike which has paralyzed the port of New York for two days, is apparent. Leaders of the 16,000 workmen on tug boats, lighters and ferry boats declared emphatically that they were prepared for a finish fight. Their employers, the members of the New York Boat Owners Association, were equally emphatic in their assertion that they never would yield to the demand for an eight hour day.

The most serious development Friday was the decision of the Strike Committee to revoke all exemptions they had made and thus tie up the harbor completely. This action called out men employed on fire boats and those running to islands on which are located various city charitable and reformatory institutions.

The coal question probably is the most serious. The fuel supplies of all companies operating traction lines are brought on lighters to power houses and the reserve stocks on hand are sufficient to continue operations for only a few days.

"Unless the strike is speedily ended, it will result in complete paralysis of the subway, elevated and surface lines, for all the coal on hand will be required for heating purposes.

SOLDIERS IN UNIFORM MUST NOW PAY FULL FARE ON THE RAILWAYS
Soldiers in uniform have to pay full

fare on the railroads, according to new instructions which have been received by the District Passenger Agent here. The local office here could give no definite reason for the change. Under an arrangement in existence since almost the commencement of the war, all ranks in uniform were given a return ticket for the price of single fare.

FRIDAY'S EVENTS IN BERLIN NOT KNOWN OUTSIDE

Dr. Karl Liebknecht, Spartacan Leader, Killed in Rioting, is One Unconfirmed Report

London, Jan. 10.—Dr. Karl Liebknecht, Spartacan leader in Germany, was killed during street fighting on Thursday evening, according to a Copenhagen dispatch.

Several dispatches from correspondents in Berlin filed Friday, contained no mention of the reported death of Dr. Liebknecht.

Dispatches in fact, do not refer to happenings in Berlin, but deal with events in Provinces or with press comments. Nothing definite is known here as to what Friday's developments in Berlin really were.

GRAIN GROWERS SELECT BRANDON FOR 1919 MEETING

Concluding their sessions long after the midnight hour had struck, the delegates to the Manitoba Grain Growers' Convention, without a single exception, showed how 'he farmers of Manitoba have come to regard this city as their own home town by unanimously deciding to hold next year's convention in Brandon. No other place was mentioned. This, with the customary votes of thanks to the officers and Board of Directors, and to all who had contributed in some way to the comfort or convenience of the visiting delegates brought to an end one of the most successful Farmers' Parliaments yet held in the province. Though the delegates were at all times full of vim, there was nothing to mar the harmony that prevailed. The slight interruption occasioned by the utterances of a so-called labor man on Friday night only brought out in bolder relief, the fine spirit of comradeship which prevailed during the week's proceedings.

The stern adherence of the farmers to their professed principles of free trade was put to a severe test at the closing meeting. Though every one of them knew that they would reap a rich material advantage by a fixed price on wheat for the next harvest, there was an overwhelming majority of votes cast against a price being fixed.

When the question cropped up, it looked as if there was going to be a sharp conflict of opinion. Delegates jumped up to their feet one after the other to urge that the farmers remain true to their professions. "We have opposed protection in any form until now, and are we going to prove false to our principles now that the testing hour has arrived," as the burden of a dozen speeches. It soon transpired that the debaters were all debating to the same purpose and an immense roar of cheering went up when the vote against a fixed price was carried by an overwhelming majority.

By way of contrast, the delegates made short shrift of resolutions submitted that did not meet with their approval.

Not in Newspaper Business.

Several items on the resolutions paper were tabled, while one or two failed even to find a proposer or second to father them when they were brought to the floor of the convention. This was notably the case with the motion from the Elm Bank Association: "That the project of establishing a daily paper that will be truly representative of public opinion be discussed." This did not apparently appeal to any of the delegates and it was consequently brushed aside without discussion.

That the Grain-growers are anxious that young men growing up should prepare themselves to take the reins of leadership in due course may be gathered from the whole-hearted endorsement of the resolution previously passed by the executive:

"Whereas, we find that one of the serious handicaps of rural life in Manitoba today is the lack of understanding or rural problems and consequent lack of co-ordination and progressive effort,

"And whereas, in order to overcome these conditions rural leaders must be trained from among the young people of our country districts.

"And whereas we understand that in our Provincial Agricultural College there is not at the present time a department specifically devoted to the most important line of study.

"Therefore we, the Executive of the

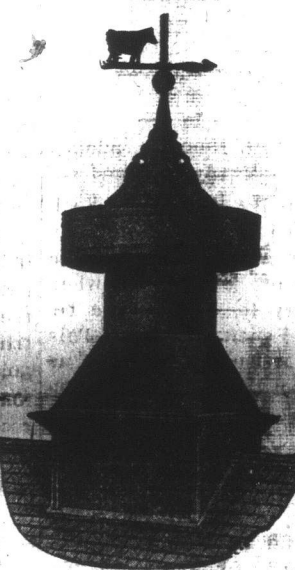
