OTTAWA, Dec. 29 .- After many conortrawa, Dec. 29.—After many conferences with the brotoerhood of rail way trainment and officials of the different railways the Railway Commission has given judgment and produlgated orders for better protection of railways employees. The orders are of interest to trainmen all over the Dominion. All enginemen must be over 21 years of age and must have served at least one year as firemen before being appointed to such position.
