THANKSGIVING DAY.—Thursday, November 23rd, has been chosen as Thanksgiving day.

The Dorchester Agricultural Fair is to be held on the Society's new grounds at Memramook Driving Park on Tuesday Oct. 17th not the 15th as previously announced.

HARVEST FESTIVAL.—The annual harvest festival will be held in St. Paul's church Sunday evening next. The service will be semi-sacred and the offerings will be in aid of the widows and orphans fund. Offerings of fruit, vegetables, grain, or flowers will be thankfully received by the rector any time before Sunday.

The final results of this thorough course in daily physical drill greatly benefit the health and constitution of the students, and does much to make the young ladies graceful in carriage, and charming in manners.

The foot ball team is organizing for a trip to Nova Scotia. The forward line is exceptionally strong.

The seminary building has a new and larger steam boiler for heating purposes. Dr. Borden is constantly introducing improvements in and about the building, meantime, not neglecting the mental culture and moral welfare of his students.

The Conservatory orchestra is doing earnest work, the results of which will be shown our citizens in public during the current school year.

The Director of the Conservatory proves himself a fine conductor and drill master in chorus work. He is giving a part of the hour to instruction in sight reading, and in this use the celebrated Tonic Solfa method. He has been an active factor in the introduction of this method in the States.

The reading room of the Conservatory is now supplied through the kindness of the Director, with nearly every important musical magazine published in the English language.

Valuable additions have lately been made to the University library including thirty-five volumes of the Dictionary of National Biography up to date. This will comprise when complete about fifty volumes and be the finest biographical history in the language. It is purchased from a bequest of the late Dr. M. Murray of Halifax. The regular semi-annual addition to the library comprises about 40 volumes including Gardiner's History of the Civil War, Sir W. Scott's Biography, new additions of Tennyson and Coleridge, Carpenter's work on the microscope, Morris's Napoleon and Fowler's Julius Caesar in the Heroes of the Nations series, Marsh's Memoirs, and a number of single volumes in history and English literature.

A SCHOONER SUNK.—Word was received here, yesterday, that the schooner Eva-J Moore bound from Joggins to this port, had sunk on Wednesday night off Apple River, N. S. in 15 fathoms of water. The Moore was about 90 tons register, was commanded by Capt. Roberts and had a crew of 10 men.

FARMINGTON DEAF AND DUMB INSTITUTE.—Mr. George E. Powers, one of the assistants will be in town in the course of a few days with the object of calling upon the friends and subscribers of the above Institution residing in Sackville and vicinity. The total number of pupils enrolled during the year was 37, Westmorland County having been represented by the following seven pupils: Melrose, D'Oro, Memramook, Humphrey, Lutes, Moncton, Douglas Trenholm, Port Elgin, Monty Trenholm, Port Elgin, Warren Allen, Cape Tormentine, Margaret Trenholm, Port Elgin and Ida Trenholm Port Elgin. When the new building was erected, accommodation was provided for fifty or sixty pupils. The committee will therefore be glad to hear of the names and addresses of uneducated deaf mute children that the privileges of the institution may be extended to all who may be eligible for admission.

ONE MORE FIRE.—Immediately after church on Sunday evening it was discovered that an unoccupied house on Slab Lane belonging to Mr. Thos. Etak Brooks was in flames and by nine o'clock the last timber fell and the building was in ashes. This is the second loss for the season. The first was at Westport and like the first was beyond doubt due to incendiaries. The building had been moved to its position on Slab Lane some three years ago and new floors and other repairs had been given it so that it was of some value. Additional outside repairs were to be made and a family was to move in this week. There was no insurance. A large crowd assembled and the sea of faces rising tier on tier along the side hill and lighted by the lurid rays from the burning building and the brilliant moonlight streaming down from overhead made a picture of extreme beauty.

During the evening oysters and other light refreshments were served before the band-boys by Mrs. Botsford and handled in their usual artistic manner. The music stopped and the people dispersed about ten o'clock.
