New Mail Route.—We are happy to be able to announce to our readers, that the Government have had in contemplation for some time the propriety and necessity of changing the Mail route between this Island and Nova Scotia, selecting Tatmagouche, which is directly opposite to us, instead of Pictou, as the place for landing and receiving the Mails; and running a Steamer daily to that place. We believe the views of the Government are so far matured upon this very important subject, that they may be submitted to the Legislature in the course of a few days; and we have no hesitation in saying that on a subject involving so many important public interests as a rapid and efficient mail communication with the other Provinces, the two Houses of Legislature will promptly and almost unanimously co-operate with the Government. One of the many great advantages of the proposed route is, that Tatmagouche will be a convenient rendezvous, and far more so than Pictou, for persons travelling towards the Island from either Nova Scotia or New Brunswick.—*Examiner.*

To the Editor of HASZARD'S GAZETTE.

Sir, Will you permit me through the medium of your useful Gazette, to make a few observations upon a correspondence which has lately appeared in the *Examiner* newspaper? I perceive that the Hon. Robert Mooney, in replying to Mr. Kenny's letter, in reference to Mr. LePage's petition, refers to his votes in the House of Assembly to prove that he is not "the natural enemy of Education," and takes credit to himself for having opposed the *drones* who "exposed the ignorance of the Country people." What Robin Adair or his *amantissis* means by this indefinite writing, it is somewhat difficult to determine. I confess, Mr. Editor, that I am not very well acquainted with the internal regulations of a bee-hive, but I believe the term *drone* is applied to such members of the Commonwealth, as do little or nothing for a large amount of honey which they consume. If this definition of the term be allowed, then the Hon. Gentleman's remarks will apply to himself, with greater relevancy, than to any other person in the Island. The Masters of the Academy have plenty of work to do, and it may be assumed they perform it to the satisfaction of their patrons, otherwise the parents of the pupils would prefer sending them to the *Free Schools*, by which they would save at least part of the fees which are payable at that institution. The fact, then, that the Academy is numerously attended, proves, that the Masters are not *drones*, and so far from exposing the ignorance of the Country people, I am bold to say, on the other hand, that the Teachers of the Academy have done more towards instructing the Country teachers, than Mr. Mooney is able to appreciate.

Who then, let me enquire, are the *drones* referred to in Mr. Mooney's letter? If the term will not apply to the Masters of the Academy, it may, perhaps, suit somewhere else. Well, then, in order to come to an unmistakable understanding of the ambiguous word, let us suppose a case. If in a "poor country" like this, far from England, and farther from Melbourne, some office under the Government—say for example that of the office of *Registrar of Deeds*—was to be filled, and a choice made with due regard to economy (which in a poor country should never be lost sight of,) one might suppose a person would be selected to fill such office competent to discharge the duties thereof, and if he did so, he could not, any more than a teacher in the Academy, be styled a *drone*. But supposing still, that a person utterly incompetent, from want of Education, to copy and engross a common *deed*, was to force himself into the place, though no more capable of writing than I of using the club of Hercules, and such person was to receive as the reward of his incompetency £150 per annum—while the man who really did the business only received £100—and that, by his incompetency, the cost to the poor country of keeping up that Office, was raised from £100 to £250—such a person, Mr. Mooney himself will allow, may with propriety be denominated a *drone*, and yet, so unproductive a *bee* may be found within the hive at the Colonial Building, and notwithstanding all the Hon. Mr. Mooney's *threadbare* oratory against foolishly voting away the money of his constituents, this particular item has not yet been objected to by the Hon. Member for Flinty Glen.

Mr. Mooney states, that "if Mr. Kenny knew the state of the Country people, he would be ashamed of his letter." In this particular then we may suppose Mr. Mooney will not be disposed to plead ignorance. And yet with all his knowledge of their state and pretended zeal for their welfare, he voted for a grant of £300 to the School visitor contrary to the Colonial Statute 15, Vic. Cap. 13, which says:—"The salary of such School Visitor shall be £200 per annum, to be paid to him quarterly on producing the certificate of the Board of Education of his being entitled to receive the same." to which fact, I believe, that the Board have never yet certified; when, had he read the Educational Gazette as attentively a few weeks ago and digested its contents as perfectly as he seems to have done since, he might consistently have recorded his vote on the other side of the question. Mr. Mooney is also intimately acquainted with the person who pockets £150 yearly for doing absolutely nothing, and he has never raised his *sweet brogue* in favour of having such an unprofitable *drone* turned out of the Commonwealth! "Pattern of just equality!" (ahem.)
