BACK TO SCHOOL

The sound of the school bell is again heard in the land. The long summer vacation in which the young people have been storing up new strength and vigor is over. Many children will make their first entry to the schools, but what about the boys and girls starting into their teens? In this country where common school education is free, it does not make any difference how many are in the family, the opportunity to secure an education is open to rich and poor alike. This being so, it is unfortunate that so many, especially boys, drop out of school at from thirteen to fifteen years of age, just at the critical time in their lives and just when they have presumably laid the foundation for a liberal education. In some cases this may be unavoidable, but these are few in number. The average girl seems to be more diligent, ambitious and persevering than the average boy, so far as securing a good education is concerned. Many boys who wish to be considered good sports fail to measure up the very fundamental idea of a true sport—which is self-sacrificing effort. They do not play the game. They are not willing to endure the patient training and discipline necessary to make them athletes in scholarship, as they do make themselves athletes in sport. Many parents would have their boys continue longer at school but are met by a spirit of rebellion and unwillingness to respond to their wishes. Many such boys have lived to repent of their folly, when repentance was unavailable. This is an appeal for every hesitant boy to be a sport, to play the game, to submit to the discipline year to welcome the training which will fit him for the higher prizes of life. There is always a demand for well-trained men, for disciplined men, for men who are willing to make sacrifices to win prizes. For shirkers, for dodgers, for truant players the world has little use. It is up to the teen boy to face this question honestly and seriously. If he does so and he has good sense he will Get Back to School.—Wesleyan.

DEMSEY RETAINS CHAMPION TITLE

Jack Dempsey retained his world's heavyweight title, knocking out Luis Angel Firpo, the Wild Bull of the Pampas, in the second round of one of the fiercest, fastest and most spectacular battles in the history of pugilism, at the Polo Grounds, New York, on Friday night. The champion felled his Argentine challenger five times in the first round and twice in the second round before a short uppercut to the jaw sent Firpo down for the last time. But in the three minutes and 57 seconds of whirlwind, terrific mauling, Dempsey himself once was knocked clear through the ropes on the press benches and groggy under a bombardment of mighty rights, once sank to his knees. Before Firpo went hurling down to defeat carrying with him the shattered hopes of a continent, he gave a vast, frenzied throng of 85,000 one of the most thrilling and courageous ring exhibitions of all time. Battered, bloody and groggy, he showed his marvellous stamina by coming back with a whirlwind, crushing drive toward the close of the first round that had the title-holder tottering, closer to losing his crown than at any time in his career. Firpo fought the best fight of his career. The challenger's mighty right was never mightier. Against the relentless power and versatility of the champion's furious attack, he went down, but in defeat he gained more glory than in any battle of his career. He was beaten but his menace to the heavyweight throne was not removed.

WHAT IS YOUR AMBITION?

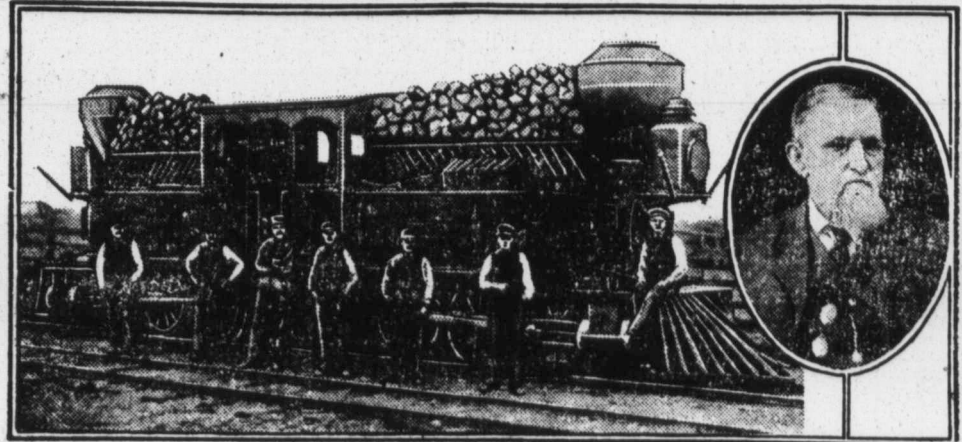
