## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The United Kingdom is in the throes of a miniature general elec- tion. There are five vacant seats for the Commons, four caused by recent judicial appointments and conse- quent changes in the Cabinet. The Government is quite naturally a lit- tle anxious, for in four contests it is on the defensive, and has to contend with a lot of dissatisfaction both with what it has done, and what it has failed to do. Unionists too, are mak- ing a determined fight in every con- stituency and are aided in some by the nomination of Labor and Social- istic candidates who always draw votes from the Liberals. The greatest in- terest centres in the contest for the Reading seat which Sir Rufus Isaacs gave up to take the Lord Chief Jus- ticeship here; the Unionists have the best chances in making a break in the Government defense; Isaacs, al- though a resident of the city, was otherwise popular and a strong can- didate and always held his seat by only narrow majorities which at the last election dwindled to 99. Captain Leslie Wilson, who fought him last election is again Unionist candidate. George Peabody Gooch, is Liberal candidate. Kelghley Division of York- shire, where Stanley Buckmaster has to seek re-election after his appoint- ment to the position of Solicitor Gen- eral, does not give the Government much concern. Buckmaster was re- turned only a year ago at the bye- election, receiving 825 over the Un- ionist candidate in a three-cornered fight. This time it is not expected there will be any official Labor can- didate, so the new Solicitor General has to contest only against the Un- ionist, Viscount Lascelles, son and heir of Earl Harewood. Two Scot- tish elections will be fought, largely on Scottish issues, in both cases the Liberals are pretty certain of success. Robert Monroe, on account of his ap- pointment as Lord Advocate for Scot- land in succession to Alexander Ure, has to go back to his constituency to have his appointment endorsed. He defeated Sir Arthur Bignold in 1910 by a majority of 211. No Unionist candidate has yet been selected. The other Scottish contest is for Linlith- gowshire, which Alexander Ure vacated to become Lord President of the Court of Sessions. He had repre- sented the constituency for twenty years, always being elected by large majorities, last time by 2070, so it ought to be safe for a Liberal again this time. The candidate chosen by the Government Party is Mr. Pratt, former Bailie of Glasgow, a strong temperance advocate; his opponent will be James Kidd, Solicitor. There will be no contest at the bye-election for the Northern Division of County Cork where John Guiney has been nominated.
