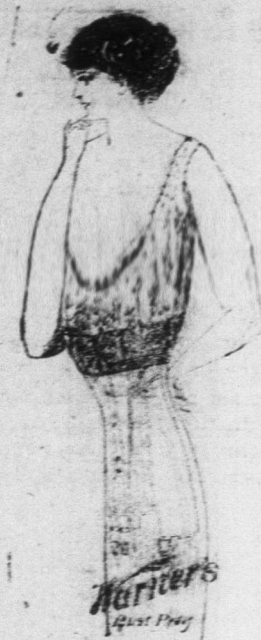

The Newfoundland Disaster Enquiry Before Judge Knight

(Continued from 5th page.)

During the day we picked up a few of our pans, but could not see much for stormy weather and wheeling of the ice. We picked up 8 or 10 pans and stopped at night a little to the N.W. of our position at 10 the night before. On Thursday a.m. the Newfoundland was about a mile and a half from us, about S.E. Shortly after daylight I learned that the Newfoundland had been ensnared. I told my men to run up our ensign, because I thought he would think me anxious about his crew, and run up his flag to let me know it was all right. I then found we had a ball up also to attract attention, but we could not see it. Shortly after the flags were hauled down and a distress signal run up. We were jammed very tight, and I sent two men aboard to find out the trouble, going into the barrel and saw the distress signal. Shortly after the men came back and told us the sad news, and that nine of his men were coming. I ordered my crew up, gave them stimulants, food, and every requirement obtainable, and told them to go to the Newfoundland for instructions. The Bellaventure was west of us. I wired and asked him to look out. The captain wired that he had two survivors on board, and reported a large number of men dead. When I got Capt. Randell's message and knew where the men lay, I commenced butting to get my ship's head towards them, endeavoring to get men towards the Bellaventure, where they went. Shortly after I saw one man walking down who was conveyed to my ship, but much worse for all his exposure. I think he was Patrick Hearn. Communication with Captain Randell showed that all had been done that I had suggested. Captain Randell did noble work in connection with the rescue that day. We got our other live man over a distance of two or three miles, his name was Simon Trask. We also got two dead men, one Eli Keim, the other I don't know. We were all day getting about six miles with the heaviest butting I ever had, and then made for the Newfoundland, but could not reach her until after daylight Friday, when I went on board, got her articles, a list of the living on board; and then went on the Bellaventure, got a list of survivors there, with those on my own ship, transferred the dead to the Bellaventure, and sent my doctor on board the Bellaventure. There were 77 dead. The Newfoundland did not have wireless this year, but had four years ago. I think the tragedy would have been averted if she had wireless.

and at the slow speed which I had gone, that if they had come towards me I could not have failed to have got them. I was then alongside the heavy ice at that time. The wind was E.S.E., blowing from the heavy ice towards me in the smaller ice. As a matter of fact the currents have more effect with the ice than the wind. On that night the smaller ice was packed tighter on the heavy ice than earlier in the day. Owing, no doubt, that the small ice extended to the land, and a gale of E.S.E. on that big ice had a tendency to pack with the small ice and the big ice all together. My reasons for staying where I did on the evening of Tuesday on the plan marked 5 a.m. March 31st, where I burnt down for the night, being practically the place where I burnt down the previous night, was that I got as near to the edge of the big ice as possible and I wanted to keep as far to the windward as possible so that the sound from my whistle would be heard to leeward, and as near to the edge of big ice as possible, because I knew that if they were coming for me they would either follow the lines of carcases or follow the edge of big ice, and I knew that no practical man would hold on panning seals after 2 o'clock that evening. If he had made for his own ship he would certainly have got on board of her as I thought. If he was waiting for us he would be bound to get the sound of our whistle. The big ice was an impassable barrier at this time. If I had thought that the Newfoundland crew had not reached their ship I could have reached the spot where I had dropped them off near the seals, but no further. Had I got there I could not have done any good because these men had gone long before that and got their own ship. If I had gone down to where I dropped the Newfoundland's men near the Stephano's flag and kept my whistle blowing and followed up the edge of the heavy ice, and apparently less than a mile from their morning track, they would not have heard the Stephano's whistle.
