Brothers in Arms.

MOTHER WHO HAS 17 SONS IN
THE ARMY—A SHROPSHIRE
RECORD.

Deciding that he could not stay at home while his sixteen brothers and step-brothers were fighting for their King and Country, a farm servant named John Davies, aged 29, enlisted in the Army Service Corps at Wellington, Salop.

His enlistment adds to the remarkable record of his family, for there are now no fewer than seventeen brothers or step-brothers serving in the army.

The patriotic example of the family of Davies dates back to Sergeant Davies, the father of the man who enlisted recently, for at the time when Sergeant Davies died in India, when serving with the Shropshire Regiment, he had eight sons also serving with the British Army in India.

Mrs. Davies, the mother of these patriotic sons, lives at Church Street, Salop, and has been married twice.

Before the outbreak of the war the family was already well represented in the army. There are now twelve sons of Mrs. Davies serving with the King's Shropshire Light Infantry, two in the Welsh Fusiliers, and two who enlisted in Kitchener's army after the outbreak of the war, in addition to the young man who was enrolled at the Wellington recruiting depot. Several of the brothers were called up as reserves and left England with the Expeditionary Force.

RUSSIA WILL SELL HER STORES TO WESTERN ALLIES

London, Feb. 10.—An important result of the conference of the Ministry of Finance of Great Britain, France and Russia in Paris, is, according to an article by Dr. E. J. Dillon in the Daily Telegraph, that the vast piles of cereals now hoarded in Russia will be sold and conveyed to Western Europe by way of Archangel and Vladivostok.

The cost of conveyance will be down to the lowest limits by the production of special freights, reduction in the cost of transportation, taken together with the prices of foodstuffs which now in Russia, and the exceptional abundant crops in Siberia, will enable the exporter to sell corn to Allies at rates which cannot but be a beneficial effect on the market generally from the consumer's view.

"As long as Russia had to keep foodstuffs within her own bound other corn-growing countries," Dillon remarks, "had it in their or to raise prices to their hearts' content. But once the Allies find their advantage to draw on Russian granaries, supply and demand tend to be equalized and foodstuffs will become proportionately cheaper."

This transaction, which was unanimously agreed upon by the Ministers, will further have the effect of lightening the burden of Russian indebtedness and of contributing to a better rate of exchange.
