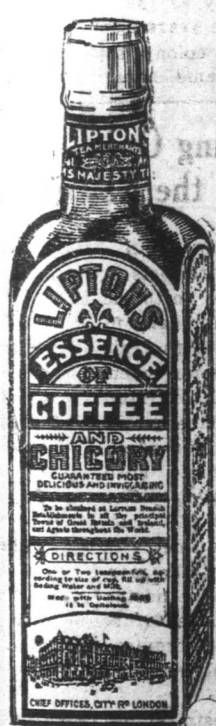

A Stranger's Appreciation

The following description of Newfoundland is taken from an article in the Literary Digest entitled "Glimpses of Summer Playgrounds." Obviously the work of a stranger, it may appear, it is highly appreciative of our natural attractions, and may prove more effective in removing the doubts of the sceptically inclined in this country than volumes written locally. The article reads as follows:

NEWFOUNDLAND.

The four-thousand-mile coast line indented with numerous fjords is comparable to Norway. One-third of the interior is occupied by innumerable lakes. Rivers ranging in length from seventy to two hundred miles, mountains rising to altitudes of 3,000 feet and vast forests of fir, pine, maple and birch, form a region favored by sportsmen. Game and fish are found in profusion. The summer climate is uniformly cool and invigorating. "Newfoundland" was first visited by white men when John and Sebastian Cabot landed on its shores in 1497. In 1538 Sir Humphrey Gilbert arriving at the present site of St. John's, the leading harbor, took possession in the name of Queen Elizabeth. In 1702 St. John's was alternately in the hands of the French and British. Newfoundland is now a Crown Colony. Among the objectives of summer tourists are St. John's on a majestic harbor; Placentia, ancient French capital; Bonaville, Port Blandford and Terra Nova in the east coast region; Grand Lake, Deer Lake, Bay of Islands, and St. George's in the western territory.

Access.—The main gateway is via Canadian National Railways to North Sydney, Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia, thence by Newfoundland Government Steamer Line to Port aux Basques, an overnight trip, three sailings weekly. From Port aux Basques rail service through the interior is provided by the Newfoundland Government Railway. Direct steamship services between New York, Halifax and St. John's are given by Red Cross Line and between south and east coast ports by local steamers. Service also provided between Boston, Halifax and St. John's by Munson Line.

LABRADOR.

The coast of this far-flung Northland is indented with a suggestion of deep fjords flanked by rocky cliffs towering from 2,000 to 3,000 feet above the sea. While the interior regions are little explored and inaccessible, summer travelers will find the coast settlements of white fishermen, Indians and Eskimos of unique interest. Labrador is governed by the Dominion of Newfoundland.

Access:—The cruise to Labrador begins at St. John's, Newfoundland. Two routes are available. The Red Cross Line route skirts the eastern Newfoundland coast with calls at about thirty ports, thence across the Straits of Belle Isle to Battle Harbor, Labrador, thence along the Labrador coast to the port of Nain, the round trip occupying about 13 days. Another route is that from St. John's by Red Cross Steamship, calling at West Coast Newfoundland ports as far as Bonne Bay, thence by Newfoundland Government Railway Steamship Line direct to Battle Harbor.

In the Realms of Sport

STIRLING WILL MEET GEORGE COOK
George Youth And Fighting Australian To Clash At Boston, June 15.

BOSTON, June 5.—Willie "Young" Stirling may have faced a lot of boxers in his preliminary scramble to ring fame, but since he started to approach the fistic peak he certainly has asked no quarter from the best in his class. Stirling clipped the wings of many an aspiring bird in every division from the bantamweight ranks right down to the heavyweight division, in which class he recently made his debut by registering a knockout over Romero Rojas, the Chilean, who has stayed the distance with some big fellows considered in the running for heavyweight title.

Stirling's ambition now is to reach out for the heavyweight wreath and from this distance he looks good to attain his goal. Of course Willie will be given plenty of rough treatment on his way up, which is no more than expected, but in view of his youth, speed and skill, he should make the grade.

Disposing of Rojas was quite an achievement, and his next venture for heavyweight distinction will see him in a meeting with none other than George Cook, the Australian.

The Commercial A. C. yesterday clinched the match and will offer it June 15, at Mechanics Hall.

TILDEN TO HAVE CHANCE FOR REVENGE

Great Tennis Player To Meet Richards Again At Boston Next Week.

NEW YORK, June 4.—Bill Tilden is to have his opportunity next week either in the New England tennis championships at Hartford, or the Church Cup inter-city matches at the Longwood Cricket Club of Boston, of avenging his recent defeat at the hands of Vincent Richards. It is no

certainly, however, if he will be able to avenge it. If Richards can repeat his sensational performance that brought him a four-set triumph after the champion at Orange last Saturday, Tilden will find it difficult to prevent another defeat.

No player in recent years, not even Williams M. Johnston, has given Tilden the trouble that Richards has. No player has secured as many victories over Tilden since he won the national championship for the first time five years ago. Time was when tennis fans did not take Tilden's defeats by Richards very seriously—when young Vinnie was Tilden's doubles partner and protegee.

Not a few were inclined to attribute those setbacks to Tilden's whim and charity. But that false belief is no longer entertained. Since their break as a doubles combination more than two years ago, Tilden has had every reason to beat Richards as decisively and as quickly as possible, and there has been no mistaking the effort the champion has made every time he has faced his youthful rival.

Vinnie Is Topnotcher.

The fact of the matter is that Richards has arrived among the truly tennis greats, and is strong enough to extend Tilden whenever he happens to be in good physical condition. He proved that last season when, after winning the Olympic title abroad, he gave Tilden his hardest match in years in the semi-final of the national championship and then defeated Gerald Paterson in straight sets in the Davis Cup challenge round.

In the Church Cup matches of last spring Richards was within several strokes of victory over Tilden in an extra set tussle at the Germantown Cricket Club when a thunderstorm cut the contest short. It was never resumed.
