Wissler and blew open the safe. It seems they obtained an entrance through on the ground floor, they then put a quantity of powder through the key hole, applied a fuse, and set it off. The safe was very much shattered, but not completely opened. It is gratifying to state that they only obtained about fifty

A tin box was on the top of the safe which they supposed contained money, which they carried off, but as it only contained papers it was useless to them; it was found open near the premises next morning. There was about \$2,000 in the safe, which the burglars might have taken had they succeeded in opening it.—Elora Times.

On May 17th, Dr. Burns of Toronto preached in the Free St. George's and Free South Church, Paisley, Scotland, to crowded congregations. At the close of his service in the latter church, the doctor alluded to his former connection with the town, he having been a minister in Paisley for thirty-four years, though twenty-three years have elapsed since he gave up his charge of Free St. George's to proceed to Canada. During his stay at the Rev. Mr. Pollock's house in Paisley he was visited by great numbers of his old parishioners and friends.

The Moscow Gazette has published a article on the late reforms in Turkey, to which an official stamp has been given by its republication in the Journal de St. Petersburg, the organ of the Russian foreign office. The western powers are ra-ther sharply lectured by these Russian organs for their approval of the new re-forms by the Turkish Ministry. The Journal then goes on to say, Turkey has empowered Belgian, French, and Austrian sequenters to establish railways, and given them a substantial guarantee; it has admitted two Christians to the Ministry, but not to the Cabinet, and promises the establishment of a Council of State in which Mussulmans and Christians are to sit, and whose president is to be a member of the Ministry; and it has introduced the system of vilagies in a considerable number of the provinces of the empire.—Next comes the usual abuse of the Turkish Government in Crete, spiced by a quotation from Lord Stanley, who is reported as having said that "The Cretan separatists will no longer allow themselves to be deluded by any concession." The three measures above-mentioned are then discussed one by one. The railways are represented as being planned, not for the good of Turkey itself, but for the spread of Austrian influence in the country; the admission of Christians to the Ministry is a mere comedy for the benefit of European quidnues, and the organization of the vilagiets, or provincial assemblies, as only a new mode of securing the predominance of the Mussulmans in the local administrations. The article concludes by the following significant passage:

"It is impossible to admit that the Cabinets of Paris, Vienna, and London can have mistaken the real meaning of these supposed reforms, and still less that they are hostile to the Christians in the East, and wish to increase and prolong their intolerable sufferings. This new step can therefore only be ascribed to distust and systematic ill will towards Russia. Instead of being angry at this, it gives us pleasure. Great advantages are connected with a monopoly of truth and justice. It will soon appear that our adversaries have selected the wrong course. While obstinately persisting in an antagonism which is equally foolish and unjust, they will learn to their own cost the error of their calculations. In awaiting the moment when the inevitable hour of retribution shall come, we have no reason to be disquieted at our isolation in the East, if we continue with a firm step in the speculators to establish railways, and given them a substantial guarantee; it
