IMFORTANT MURDER THIAL.—A case of murder engaged the attention of the Court of Assize, now sitting in London, on both Saturday and Monday last. Two brothers, named Thos. and Henry Jones, lived on the worst of terms on adjoining farms in the township of Delaware. On the 11th of last June Mrs. Henry Jones sent her daughter Mary, aged about 12 years, to her uncle's to get some flour that had been previously bofrowed, and the girl never returned allve. After a long search her body was found in the woods covered by some leaves and sticks. Thomas Jones, his two sons, and a daughter a little older than the murdered girl, were all arcested as being principals in, or accessory to, the deed. Thomas Jones, was first tried. The evidence against him was all circumstancial, and, singular to relate, his daughter having been put in the witness box confessed that she had gone out with her cousin, that they had quarrelled, that the other girl hafts struck her with a stick, and that she returned the blow causing death. There were many contradictions in her testimony, and it seemed eviden that she had been influenced, or intimidated to take the onus of the crime in order to clear her father. But his conduct, his words, and some other circumstances con-spired to make a pretty clear case against him, notwithstanding his daughter's al-legations, and he was found " guilty." It appears that the prisoner had a special dialike to the girl he murdered, as he had one time robbed the house of another brother for a bond or a deed, and she being present detected him in his dis-guide.
