Professor. Those organs will not now be able to repudiate the weight of his authority upon a purely constitutional point, which he is eminently qualified to disense, when it is found to tell with crushing effect against themselves. Of what it may be politic for this country to do, affecting its own internal affairs, Canadians are more competent to judge than any stranger. Of strictly constitutional questions, or a question of high crimes and misdemeanors he is competent to speak with authority, having made these aspecialty. We attach therefore, much more than ordinary value to the scathing criticism of the position of Ministers and the conduct of Lord Dufferin which is given to the public in the columns of our contemporary the Canadian Monthly, just issued.—Cornwall Freeholder.
