"CURRENT EVENTS" in the Canadian Monthly for September is a very remarkable paper. The writer is well known to be Professor Goldwin Smith, a gentleman qualified in an eminent degree to discuss the merits of the recent 12th of August. He treats the subject calmly and in the spirit of a judicial rather than a critical, much less a partisan, reviewer. Professor Smith is a liberal of the extreme school. In England he is classed as a radical. But in this country, and with relation to political parties here, he has scarcely as yet taken a side. He is certainly not a partisan in his relation to Canadian politics; but heretofore his leanings have been decidedly towards the Ministerial party. His emphatic condemnation of the Ministerial position, therefore, in the matter of the Pacific Scandal and the prorogation of the House last month is all the more significant and valuable. Goldwin Smith has been repeatedly quoted by Ministerial organs in defence of the policy of their masters when the matter affected was one upon which Canadians were far more competent to judge than even the erudite ex-Professor. Those organs will not now be able to repudiate the weight of his authority upon a purely constitutional point, which he is eminently qualified to discuss, when it is found to tell with crushing effect against themselves. Of what it may be politic for this country to do, affecting its own internal affairs, Canadians are more competent to judge than any stranger. Of strictly constitutional questions, or a question of high crimes and misdemeanors he is competent to speak with authority, having made these a speciality. We attach therefore, much more than ordinary value to the scathing criticism of the position of Ministers and the conduct of Lord Dufferin which is given to the public in the columns of our contemporary the Canadian Monthly, just issued.—Cornwall Freeholder.

Louis Dixon, the Indian who was convicted at the late Assizes of an indecent assault, and sentenced to one year's imprisonment and fifty lashes, received his first instalment of 25 lashes at Hamilton, on Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The prisoner walked bravely to the place of punishment and submitted to be tied to the triangle without resistance. The cat used was composed of leather thongs eleven in number, but without knots. It was laid on his bare shoulders smartly, but not by any means heavily. The first two or three cuts he bore without flinching, but afterwards he writhed considerably, but did not cry out, though he moaned audibly. The operation did not last more than a few minutes. After it was over the prisoner was untied, and put on his clothes without assistance. Great Britain has paid over its little bill of \$15,500,000 to the United States. A document noting terms of the payment is to be framed and preserved among the archives of the United States Government. The Geneva arbitrators have had services of plate presented to them to keep in remembrance their share in the matter. Poor England has nothing to preserve in the matter, unless it has prepared a tablet.
