Under its proteing influence normal development at ages is allowed and fostered while tacilities it affords for relf-indugence constantly acting in an opposite direction. ages is allowed and fostered while the facilities it affords for relf-indulgence are constantly acting in an opposite direction. The case of Hugh McLeod, aged almost 107, which has lately been published, illustrates in a remarkable manner the truth of these observations. This man, a Ross-shire Highlander, in what must be the somber twilight of a blameless and fairly active life spent in his native country, still shows, it is said, a notable degree of vigor. He takes a lively interest in the affairs of life, has a good appetite, is generally healthy, cuts and carries his peat for household uses and goes about among his neighbors as of old. His food is of the plainest, though nutritious—porridge, fish, a little meat; and his habits in this and other matters is not unworthy the attention of many who are daily hastening, by opposite courses, the end of a merrier, shorter, but perhaps not happier life.

competing with Chinese Labor.

In San Francisco the sewing girls have to compete with Chinese labor, and their wages amount to \$4.50 a week. Here in New York the American girls have been driven out of the clothing shops altogether by the Polish, Russian and Hungarian women, who work ten hours a day seven days in the week for \$4. The average wages paid the factory girls by suit, cap, cloak, feather, flower and underwear manufacturers is \$3.70. Perhaps 300 forewomen get \$25 a week, and a number are able to earn \$6 after ten years' service, but there are thousands of little girls and young women who begin at \$1 and are raised at the rate of 75 cents a year.—[New York World.]
