Will the Michigan Central Sidetract Detroit.

"It's rather funny to see the way Jas. F. Joy threatens not to play if things don't go to please him," said a railroad man yesterday. "Now, how would it doif the Michigan Central refused to play? Detroit people want to give everything to the new roads and take away as much s they can from the old." "But the Michigan Central is in now and

roads and take away as much room the old."

"But the Michigan Central is in now and must play," was suggested.

"I'm not so sure of that. Of course the Michigan Central is in here, but they don't need to play. Now just look at a map of Michigan. You see Ypsilanti. Now draw a line from Ypsilanti to the Michigan Central's crossing at Amherstburg and see how much shorter the distance is that way from Ypsilanti to Essex Center than by coming up through Detroit. The Michigan Central went to the expense of building that line from Essex Center to Detroit to bring the traffic through the city. Bringing this traffic here means the employment of a large force of men in the Detroit yards and is a benefit to Detroit in many ways. It would be a big advantage to the Michigan Central to side-track Detroit, for the through service is much more important than any local business furnished here. The crossing is better at Amherstburg, for it seldom freezes up, and for bridging it would be a great deal better, for the channel there is very narrow. If they made the change there would be no trouble about street crossings, for all that would be needed would be to run a plag train up from the crossing to Detroit, and the local traffic wouldn't obstruct the streets to any great extent. Of course this may not be done, but this talk about refusing to play can work both ways. The Michigan Central has built a fine depot here and done a great deal for Detroit, but nobody seems to remember it."—[Detroit Free Press.
