THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

Forecast, March 30, a.m.—The depres-
sion which existed Friday night over the
Ohio Valley after moving with great
rapidity to the mid-Atlantic coast. A dis-
turbance of some importance now covers
the Western States, and the pressure is highest in
the lake regions. The weather has been gen-
erally fine in Canada, minimum and maximum
temperatures: Calgary, 29-50; Qu'Appelle,
32-38; Winnipeg, 28-37; Toronto, 30-45;
Montreal, 34-47; Quebec, 27-40; Halifax,
30-44.
Local temperature—about 20° above zero;
low wind.

TODAY'S PROBABILITIES.—The indica-
tions for the next 24 hours for the lower lake
region and the province are: light to strong winds,
and mostly easterly; rain, continued very
mild.
