Recommendations of the Executive and Legal Option Committees—A Plan
of Political Action Approved
—The Officers,

Toronto, Sept. 14.—The report of the executive committee of the Dominion Alliance submitted yesterday summed up the results of local option in the Provinces and detailed the progress made. It was said that the results of the royal commission showed that where Local Option Acts were in force there had been nearly an absolute prohibition of the liquor traffic. The following were the recommendations of the committee: That continued efforts be made to secure prohibitory bylaws in municipalities where there was a reasonable hope of their being carried; that the Ontario Legislature be requested to take action to secure a vote of the Provincial electorate on the direct issue of prohibition; that the organization of the prohibition; that the organization of the prohibition electorate he urged in every municipality on the lines already laid down, in view of the Probable plebiscite work ahead of the Alliance.

Mr. Howland delivered the president's address. He said that although the success of the Alliance might seem a little slow, still there certainly was an advance as the result of the steady work done. He referred to the present Government commission, and said that the commission had been appointed, probably, with the intention of giving the Legislature a rest on this question.

Mr. W. W. Buchanan gave a sketch of the establishment of the advanced prohibitionists and an outline of the objects of the new organization. They wished to found clubs in the different municipalities for the purpose of perfecting measures, which though adopted by the Alliance had never been put into effect. The members of the clubs are supposed to pledge themselves to the support of the political party which has prohibition for a plank in its platform.

The legislation committee's reportelicited considerable discussion. That in the meantime such steps be taken to secure the amendment of the present License Act so that a majority of municipal electors in a polling subdivision shall have the right to prevent the re-issue of a license. That we petition the Provincial Legislature in favor of woman's suffrage."


