The Seymour Expedition

Appears Certainly to Have Been Relieved,

But It Failed to Connect With Pekin and Returned to Tien Tsin-The Force Suffered Severely-Assistance Reached the Admiral on the Night of Monday, June 25-Between 40,000 and 60,000 Chinese Troops Now Before Pekin-Southern Viceroy Sends the Consuls an Ultimatum-Consuls Ordered to Leave Pekin.

Che Foo, June 28-Via Shanghai-At Noon. Admiral Seymour's expedition has been relieved, having failed to connect with Pekin. There is no news from Pekin. The Russian colonel, Schelle, commanding the combined forces of 10,000 men, is supposed to be proceeding to Pekin. Admiral Seymour's expedition is returning to Tien Tsin, his force having suffered greatly.

St. Petersburg, June 28.-The minister of war has received the following dispatch from Admiral Alexeff: "Port Arthur, June 27.-During the night of June 25 a detachment of four companies of Russians, Col. Schivinsky commanding, and the same number of foreigners, relieved Admiral Seymour, and brought 200 of his wounded to Tien Tsin."

It is estimated that 40,000 to 60,000 Chinese troops are now before Pekin. Boxers from all sections are swarming there.

A DAY OF REST.

London, Thursday, June 28, 2:30 a.m. -The Russian general in command of the relief force has decided, in view of Saturday's heavy fighting and marching, that one day's rest for the troops was essential. Meanwhile came Admiral Seymour's heliograph that his position was rendered desperate, and that he could only hold out two days. The relief force started at dawn Monday.

SATURDAY'S FIGHTING.

Saturday's fighting began at day-break. The allied forces opened with several of the Terrible's 4.7 naval guns, six field guns and numerous machine guns, the firing being at long range. They continued to advance steadily, the Chinese artillery replying. The guns of the allies were more skillfully handled, and put the guns of the Chinese out of action one by one, the Chinese retreating about noon. There was keen rivalry among the representatives of the various nations as to which should enter Tien Tsin first, and the Americans and British went in neck and neck. The Russians stormed the arsenal, thereby sustaining the largest losses.

CONSULS REQUESTED TO LEAVE PEKIN.

London, June 27.-The foreign office has issued the following telegram received from W. R. Charles, the British consul at Tien Tsin, undated, but probably sent June 24, and forwarded from Che Foo, June 27:

"A note has been received by the commissioner of customs here from Inspector-General Hart (Sir Robert Hart) at Pekin, dated June 19, stating that the foreign legations had been desired to leave Pekin within 24 hours."

The dispatch received by the foreign office stating that the foreign legations were requested to leave Pekin within a specified time is interpreted as tantamount to giving the ministers the passports, and as tantamount to a declaration of war, but as China does nothing like other nations, the official opinion is that there is nothing to do but await the course of events, and to see what the ministers themselves say when they are rescued.

All the students at the foreign hospitals in Canton are leaving. Women missionaries are returning from the River ports. There was a slight disturbance at Wo-Chou Tuesday, while the women were embarking. The crowd shouted "Kill the foreign devils."

no news from the capital. The telegram adds: "Seymour arrived at Tien Tsin with 312 of his force wounded, besides 62 killed. The damage done to Tien Tsin has been much exaggerated. Shanghai is quiet."

Berlin, June 28.-The commander of the German squadron at Taku telegraphs, under date of June 28, as follows: "The foreign ministers are with the landing force."

MANY MASSACRES. Dispatches from Shanghai reiterate the announcements of the massacres of native Christians in the inland districts which rival the Armenian horrors. The officials at the places watched by gunboats make a show of protecting the missionaries, but there is not even a pretense of protection for the converts in the interior, who have been butchered by wholesale.

Washington, June 28.-The following cablegram was received this morning by the navy department from Admiral Kempff:

"Che Foo, June 28.-About 12,000 foreign troops now ashore. Soldiers ordered should report at Taku instead of Che Foo. Substituted Nashville for Yorktown at Che Foo. Yorktown used as dispatch boat, being more suitable. Kempff."

GERMANS IN LUCK. Hamburg, June 28.-Commercial firms here have received telegrams from Shanghai saying that all the Germans at Tien Tsin are uninjured.

According to the reports of Christians, fighting continued at Tien Tsin June 25, the fortified arsenal outside the town being still in possession of the Chinese.

BRUTAL BOXERS

Awful Treatment Given Murdered Missionary Ellis.

Victoria, B. C., June 28.-The Shanghai Mercury says a member of the Boxers' society who saw the murder of Rev. Mr. Ellis, of the London mission, and of a Chinese missionary at King Tsun gave the following account of the tragedy:

"On the twelfth day of the fourth moon, the Boxers, numbering 57, crossed the River Tzu Tsun, and met the two missionaries in a boat. They knew the Chinese was a Christian, and at once attacked him, wounding him with their swords. Then they dragged him out of the boat and tied him to a tree at the river side. Then Ellis was tied with him, and Chao, another Chinese missionary, was found. His toes and thumbs were bound together, and he was carried to a tree near where the others were hung up. The arms of the missionaries were cut off, their heads hewn off, and after the bodies had been disemboweled they were cast into the river. The chapel of the mission was demolished, and the crowd went on its way." This was but one of many such outrages.

SECRET ORDERS

Sent to Russian Officials to Prepare for Mobilization.

Berlin, June 28.-The Vorwaerts says: "From an absolutely reliable source we hear the Russian war ministry has sent to all the military and civil authorities telegraphic secret orders to prepare everything for mobilization. The orders bear the dates of June 18 and 19."

SCALDED TO DEATH.
