SATURDAY'S FIGHTING.

Saturday's fighting began at daybreak. The allied forces opened with several of the Terrible's 4.7 navai guns, six field guns and numerous machine guns, the firing being at long range. They continued to advance steadily, the Chinese artillery replying. The guns of the allies were more skillfully handled, and put the guns of the Chinese out of action one by one, the Chinese retreating about noon. There was keen rivalry among the representatives of the various nations as to which should enter Tien Tsin first, and the Americans and British went in neck The Russians stormed the arsenal, thereby sustaining the largest

CONSULS REQUESTED TO LEAVE PEKIN.

London, June 27.-The foreign office has issued the following telegram re-ceived from W. R. Charles, the Brit-ish consul at Tien Tsin, undated, but probably sent June 24, and forwarded

from Che Foo, June 27:
"A note has been received by the commissioner of customs here from Inspector-General Hart (Sir Robert Hart) at Pekin, dated June 19, stating that the foreign legations had been de-The dispatch received by the for-elgn office stating that the foreign legations were requested to leave Pekin within a specified time is interpreted as tantamount to giving the ministers their possports, and as tantamount to a declaration of war, but as China does nothing like other nations, the official opinion is that there is nothing to do but await the course of events, and to see what the ministers themselves say when they are rescued.

All the students at the foreign hospitals in Canton are leaving. Women missionaries are returning from the West River ports. There was a slight disturbance at Wo-Chou Tuesday,

while the women were embarking.

A CHINESE ULTIMATUM. According to advices from Shanghai, the Chinese officials, by direction of the southern viceroys are asking the consule to agree to conditions "insuring," as the Chinese say, "the neutrality of Shanghai and other coast cities. They are also asking that foreign warships shall not sail or anchor near the forts, nor go to ports where there are no warships now; that their crews shall not go ashore, and that the protection of foreigners be left to the Chinese authorities. These conditions are considered at Shanghai to be virtually an ultimatum from Viceroys Li Kung Yih and Chang Chih Tung. The consuls desire a sufficient naval and military force to back up their refusal to comply with the demands. The total naval force there now consists of 969 men with 32 guns. The Chinese have 6,000 men and six guns, in the forts, and 10,000 men outside Shanghai with modern rifles and machine guns. The magnitude of the arrangements Japan is making suggest provision against contingencies other than the suppression of the present trouble in China. She has chartered 19 addition-

al transports, and now has 35 in all. WITH RELIEF EXPEDITION. Washington, D. C., June 27.—The following cablegram was received at

the navy department late this after-'Che Foo, June 27 .- Secretary Navy, Washington,-Pekin force and ministers reported with Pekin relief expedition entrenched eight miles from Tion Tsin.—Kempff."

CHINESE FORCES.

The Tong Shan refugees and the foreign engineer at Che Foo estimate the Chinese troops now in the field at 25,000 drilled troops at Lutal, 25,000 at Shan Hai Wan, 15,000 driven off from Tien Tsin ,and 150,000 at Pekin.

Li Hung Chang officially announces that the presence of foreign troops at the capital is due to the Boxers, and he urges all sections of the community in Canton to be ready when the occasion arises to exterminate the enemies of the country. Numerous ruffians are entering British territory.

A Chinaman connected with war purchases for the Chinese Government in Europe, who has been interviewed by the London Daily Express, says that China has immense quantities of arms and ammunition, and will "stagger humanity" if driven to defend herself.

Several thousand Japanese have left Taku for Ten Tsin, and altogether 13,-000 Japanese have landed. The international troops now aggregate nearly 20,000, and Japan is preparing to send 20,000 more, with British, American and other troops ordered to go. Probably 60,000 men will be available in a month.

#### **BRUTAL BOXERS**

Awful Treatment Given Murdered

Victoria, B. C., June 28.-The Shanghai Mercury says a member of the Boxers' society who saw the murder of Rev. Mr. Ellis, of the London mission, and of a Chinese missionary at King Tsun gave the following account

of the tragedy:
"On the twelfth day of the fourth moon, the Boxers, numbering 57, crossed the River Tsz Tsun, and met the two missionaries in a boat. They knew the Chinese was a Christian, and at once attacked him, wounding him with their swords. Then they dragged him out of the boat and tied him to a tree at the siver side. Then Ellis was tied with him, and Chao, another Chinese missionary, was found. His toes and thumbs were bound together, and he was carried to a tree near where the others were hung up. The arms of the missionaries were out off, their heads hewn off, and after the bodies had been disemboweled they were cast into the river. The chapel of the mission was demolished, and the crowd went on its way." This was but one of many such outrages.
