This is 4,868,000 acres, or 15.2 per cent less than the area sown last fall of the department's estimate, of which no modification except for acreage abandoned is necessary. Of this abandonment Kansas reports 1.835,000 acres. For the area remaining under cultivation, the average condition on May 1 was 76.4, against 94.1 on May 1. 1901, 88.9 in 1900 and 83.2 the mean of the May average of the last ten years. The present condition is the lowest May condition, with the exception of the years 1899, 1893 and 1888, since 1885. The average condition of winter rye on May 1 was 83.4, as compared with 85.4 on April 1, 1902. THE OUTBREAK

Black Rain Followed the Opening Discharge.

Deaths Resulted From Poisonous Gases-Bodies Buried in Trenches. Thirty in Each.

Fort-de-France, May 14.-The eruption of Soufriere, St. Vincent, began Wednesday. A huge cloud in a dark and dense column, charged with volcanic matter, rose to a height of eight miles from the mountain top. Darkness like midnight descended and the sulphurous air was laden with fine dust. A black rain followed-a rain of favilla, scoriae, rocks and stones.

There were bright flashes, numerous and marvelously rapid. These, with thundering, the mountain shocks, the earthquake roar, the lava and falling stones, created a scene of horror. Large areas of cultivation have been buried beneath the volcanic matter. On the windward coast seven plantations are totally destroyed. Nothing green is visible. Sixteen hundred and twenty deaths are already reported. There are 167 cases in the hospital at Georgetown under treatment.

DEATHS CAUSED BY SUFFOCA-TION.

The deaths have been caused chiefly by suffocation by the sulphurous gas, lightning and burning lava masses. Few of the cases in the hospital are likely to recover. The crew of H. M. S. Indefatigable buried 30 peasants found dead on the Owia estate, north of
