The Autonomy Bills Passed. The autonomy bills passed the House of Commons yesterday after a fusillade of amendments from the Quebec irreconcilables. Mr. Bergeron proposed to allow Catholic or Protestant ratepayers in the new provinces to conduct their schools as they saw fit. Mr. Leonard proposed to give the minority all the rights they had before the Northwest Legislature took over the control of the school system. Mr. Monk pleaded again for the official recognition of the French language. Mr. Bourassa moved for the restoration of the original school clauses of the autonomy bill. None of these amendments mustered more than seven supporters, but all the Conservative candidates in Quebec at the next general election can proclaim that the French-Canadian Conservative contingent in the House of Commons voted solidly against "the Fielding-Sifton compromise," which Monk & Co. denounce as a betrayal of the rights of their co-religionists. The western members made an effort to eliminate the C. P. R. tax exemption clauses, but Parliament is bound by every principle of public honor to keep faith with the company. Under the contract made between the C. P. R. syndicate and the Government of Sir John Macdonald, 25 years ago, the company was exempted from taxation forever upon its roadbed, rolling stock and similar property, and upon its lands for 20 years. Whether this period of 20 years dates from the completion of the road, or from the time at which the patents for each parcel of land were issued to the company is a question before the courts. These exemptions laid a heavy burden upon western development and were opposed by the Liberal party, but there is now no escape from the improvidence of the Government of that day. The contract can be annulled in the interest of the new provinces only by granting compensation to the company. This would involve the payment of an enormous sum of money and the Federal Government is not prepared to take the step at this moment, though Sir Wilfrid Laurier admits that Parliament must some day address itself to the grievance. The Government, however, recognized the handicap upon the new provinces in respect of these exemptions, and granted them ingly liberal financial terms,

Back to the Land.

Mr. Rider Haggard, the English novelist, who is making a study of the social problem, has submitted to the British Government a draft of a national land settlement scheme, based upon his recent investigations of the Salvation Army colonies in the United States. Mr. Haggard says that as time goes by his conviction is strengthened that there is but one cure for certain of the evils of civilization-to get behind them and dam them at their

"The wretchedness of our overcrowded cities, indeed, may be beyond any complete remedy, but it can, at least, be palliated by bringing numbers of their poor inhabitants into contact with the healthful pienty of the land. Some say, however, that even such palliation is impossible, for the reason that the dwellers in cities, or those who purpose to dwell in them, desire to have nothing to do with the land, and refuse to live thereon. This has never been my experience; in fact, every year considerable numbers of persons write to me individually asking me to help them to convey 'themselves and their families back from the towns to the country.
