

HAPPENINGS OF A DAY IN BUSY EAST LONDON.

Skating Is Popular on the River

The River Thames is again frozen over, and is consequently accumulating a number of ice-skating rinks. Previous to the thaw of the last few days, hundreds of East Enders took down their skates and went to the river in the vicinity of Adelaide street bridge, where the ice was in particularly good condition.

One party, composed of about ten young men from the East End, skated to Dorchester, where they played and

defeated the local hockey enthusiasts. Two iceboats have also been used on the river recently with great success. They were under perfect control of the occupants and were watched with considerable interest by a crowd from the bank.

The ice has been rather soft for the last few days and a number of young fellows have received "duckings" by going through.

NEW FIREHALL IS NEARLY COMPLETED

Apparatus For It Will Be Delivered in Six Weeks.

The new East London fire hall on Adelaide street, south of Grey street, is rapidly nearing completion, and as the new combination, chemical and hose wagon, is to be delivered in six weeks, the station will probably be opened in the latter part of February.

The new stations will afford greatly increased fire protection to the city, especially to the east end. As the limits do not extend very far east in the northern section, the north end station will provide ample protection there, while the Adelaide street and No. 2 fire halls will guard the district which is built up so rapidly south of the Grand Trunk.

It is thought that it will be but a short time until the district east of the city limits will be annexed. The population and assessment would be materially increased by annexation.

STATE QUESTIONS MAKE HAINS HOT

Denies That Conduct Towards Mrs. Hains Was Anything But Correct

Flushing, N. Y., Jan. 6.—District Attorney Darrin, in his cross-examination of Thornton J. Hains today asked the witness many questions concerning his conduct towards Mrs. Claudia Hains during the absence of her husband, Captain Hains, in the Philippines. The witness, armed with an affidavit of Mrs. Hains, put many interrogations regarding her versions that are alleged to have been held between the defendant and Mrs. Hains.

Angered by the interrogations concerning his bearing towards Mrs. Hains, the defendant made protest to the court. Hains on several occasions admitted that he could not recall what he had testified to with regard to certain things on Monday.

Mr. McIntyre interrupted, and said if the district attorney would agree to call Mrs. Claudia Hains he would have no objection to the line of the testimony. Hains, however, declared that it was not so.

The district attorney asked the witness if he had not said to Mrs. Hains that he would like to kiss her if she were not his brother's wife. The defendant's face became fiery red, and he hit his lips, and turning to the witness, he said "No." Further questions as to whether the witness had sought close relations with Mrs. Hains were overruled.

Hains was asked if he had not told Mr. Libby, father of Mrs. Claudia Hains, at Port Hamilton that Annis had been instrumental in turning down his stories, and that some day he would kill him.

"It is absurd. If I killed everyone who turned down my stories I would have to have a private graveyard," snapped the witness.

The defendant said that he did not remember saying anything to a negro waiter at the club about a girl, a waiter, whereupon the district attorney asked him if he had not testified on Monday that he asked the negro waiter about real estate agents, and the waiter talked about some agents that he knew. Hains said he did not remember what he had said.

Recess was then taken.

Mr. Parsons on the Elections.
To the Editor of The Advertiser:
There are many rough places in life's journey, we cannot make them too few, try how we may, but most of us can, by a little will-power and self-control, keep back a disagreeable expression and replace it by one not only more polite but quite as effective.

In the recent municipal contest I had two main objects in sight. My first was to, if possible, make this a model contest, free from any attempt at personality, absolutely free of canvassing for myself, as I have never yet asked any man to vote for John M. Parsons municipally, and by my example prove that it is quite possible for any citizen who can legally qualify to enter a contest, provided he has ability and character, at absolutely no expense to himself, his family or his club. This contest cost me just five street car tickets.

I think Mr. Darch and the mayor, as well as those who heard me speak, will be free to admit that I have made a clean record. The next, my real object, was to defeat the waterworks bylaw. No one as far as I could learn, had made any preparation to that end, hence, I was prepared to sacrifice myself and time to that purpose.

I knew well we could get far better results for less money; \$150,000 would give us high pressure. This I have repeatedly written and spoken of to the public. I now go a bit further. If the Beck scheme materializes, and for the sum he has stated, \$65,000, if I can see no reason in sight why it will not, another \$125,000 added would give us the pipes and special pumps from the same pump-house for a modern high-pressure equipment, and thus place London on a par with any city in Canada as to quality of water.
