Redmond Warns Premier Asquith Recalls the Fate of Roseberry

Dublin, April 15.—Speaking at a meeting this afternoon of the United Irish League, John E. Redmond, the Irish parliamentary leader, said the changes in the ministry, resulting from the assumption of the premiership of Mr. Asquith, had involved an alteration of the attitude of Ireland toward the Liberal party and he did not think that Irish voters could support Winston Churchill in the approaching by-election at Manchester.

Continuing Mr. Redmond declared that the attitude of the Premier and Secretary for Ireland Birrell toward home rule was a direct challenge to the people of Ireland, and he warned Mr. Asquith to remember the fate of Lord Roseberry. Ireland herself would have to force the home rule question to the front at the next general election, but there was nothing to be gained by withdrawing the Nationalists from Westminster.

PAT MCCARREN DOWN AND OUT

New York City Democrats Reject
His Credentials for Denver
Convention.

New York, April 5.—State Senator Patrick H. McCarren, leader of the King's County democracy, was unseated from his place as a delegate to the party's state convention after a two days' contest before the committee on credentials. He was alternately greeted with cheers and derisive cries, and once was insulted by a man on the platform near him, to whom the senator replied that he would talk to him outside of the hall. In a scene that was tense and dramatic in the extreme he first made an appeal to the convention to refuse its sanction to the majority report on credentials, and of those, whom, he said, were excluding him from a place in the party councils to which he had been chosen by his constituents.

To the Tammany delegates he delivered a threat that if the plan to put him outside the party lines were carried out no one in the convention hall would live long enough to see the election of another Democratic mayor of New York.

The senator's speech was attended with unusual and picturesque attention. From the time he entered he received the cheers of his loyal followers, but the majority were against him, and the counter demonstrations were greater in volume, but he made his

G. T. R. PENSIONS GET THREE MONTHS' TRIAL

Officials Say They Will Result in the Saving of Damages From Accidents.

Montreal, April 15.—The new pension system put in force on the 1st of January by the Grand Trunk Railway, has had three months' trial, and the officials are fully convinced of the wisdom of the move. They believe that the money is well spent and that the company will save in damages from accidents alone, enough to cover the cost of carrying and providing the fund. It is no reflection upon the older employees who have been replaced by younger ones to say that the younger men are capable of rendering better service to the company in many cases than could be expected from men who are well on in years. Of course there are exceptions to this rule. There are some men, especially among the officials, who are near the age limit, who could scarcely be replaced because of their experience and long connection with the affairs of the company. On the whole, however, the thing is working very satisfactorily to the management.

"A RIDICULOUS AND VICIOUS LAW"

North Oxford's M. P. P. Comments On Whitney's Legislation.

Mount Elgin, April 15.—At the convention of South Oxford Conservatives at Mount Elgin this afternoon, the present member, Donald Sutherland, was again chosen to represent the Conservatives of this riding in the Legislature.

A Surprise.
Mr. Sutherland surprised the great majority of those present today, when, after being nominated, he told of two measures of the Whitney Government in which he did not concur, and thereupon requested that some other man be selected to represent the party in South Oxford. The feeling of the delegates, however, was that he was their most available candidate, and a resolution was passed urging him to accept the nomination, and at the same time endorsing his "acts of independence in dealing with public issues."

Upon calling for nominations the name of Donald Sutherland, the present member, was at once moved by Messrs. King and Haller, and the motion was greeted with cheers. Mr. Sutherland expressed his thanks for the unanimous nomination which had been tendered him. In defending the present Government against the charge of extravagance, Mr. Sutherland alleged that the manner in which the past Government had squandered the natural resources of forest and mine had made this expenditure necessary.

Where He Opposed Mr. Whitney.
Mr. Sutherland stated emphatically that he did not approve of the Government's grant of \$2,500,000 to the Bay Railway. In 1904, when the Ross Government guaranteed \$4,500,000 bonds for this road, Mr. Whitney and his supporters had opposed the measure, and he could not see that the Government should change its policy now.

Mr. Sutherland had also intended to introduce a bill putting more severe restriction on the operation of automobiles through the country. His idea was to make all drivers of such machines take out a license. The Government might thus have some bond for their careful driving. The committee in which this matter was brought up, Mr. Sutherland stated, met at an earlier hour than usual, and (Mr. Sutherland) had missed the meeting.

The bill, introduced into the House just on the eve of its breaking up, provided for paid drivers taking out a license.

"A Vicious Law."
"There never was a more ridiculous, more vicious law passed," asserted Mr. Sutherland. He had tried to introduce an amendment to the law at the last session, making it necessary for all drivers to have a license, but had been hindered.

In concluding his speech, Mr. Sutherland stated that the Whitney Government had done great things for the country and might be right in some of the things to which he took exception. He, however, could not see with them on these two points, and therefore would prefer not to be a candidate.

A Great Shock.
This request came as a great shock to the convention, but it was the general feeling that Mr. Sutherland should represent the riding, and that he should go back and continue the fight he had waged this session. Finally F. J. Walley and E. W. Hughes brought in a resolution as follows:

"We, the members of the Conservative Association, in convention assembled, do hereby unanimously tender the nomination for South Oxford for the Local Legislature to Mr. Donald Sutherland, and, in doing so, express our appreciation of his many acts of independence in dealing with public issues."

The resolution passed unanimously, and Mr. Sutherland thanked the convention for their confidence. At the same time he would have been better pleased had he been allowed to withdraw, but said that since the convention would not nominate anyone else, he supposed he must accept. He warned the electors, however, that they must do their duty and work.

BACK TO SASKATCHEWAN
The Ducks Themselves May Solve Fort William's Problem.

Port Arthur, April 15.—Magistrate Palling, who sentenced the nineteen Doukhobors in jail here, has been asked by A. Power, deputy minister of justice, to recommend a pardon for the convicts, that they, with others at Fort William, might be returned to Saskatchewan, from where they commenced their pilgrimage nearly a year ago.

In the meantime those in the jail refuse to eat regular food, to work or wear clothes. They are fed on peanuts, apples and prunes, raising the cost from about seven to thirty cents per day to feed each.

DRUG MANAGER'S DEATH
Mr. Henry W. Barker Died Suddenly After an Attack of Mumps.

St. John, April 15.—Mr. Henry W. Barker, local manager of the National Drug and Chemical Company, died suddenly this morning from heart failure, following the mumps. Mr. Barker, who was 54 years of age, was made manager of the National Drug Company when it was formed. He leaves a son, Capt. L. W. Barker, of the artillery, and a daughter, Mrs. Fred Foster. SHOT TO SCARE, KILLS
Policeman Accidentally Kills Bad Boy Whom He Was Chasing.

Philadelphia, April 4.—William McHugh was shot in the back and killed here early today by policeman Phillip Hoffman, who shot to frighten the boy, whom he was trying to capture.

McHugh and several other boys, it is said, attacked a party of Italians in the southern section of the city. Hoffman chased the boys and caught McHugh and a companion. The former broke away and the policeman, to frighten the boy, fired in the air, and again into the pavement. The second ball glanced up and struck McHugh in the back, passing through his body close to the heart. The wounded boy ran a full block after being shot, and then fell unconscious, and was taken to the hospital.
