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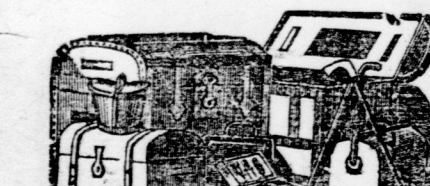

City Council Sits on Ald. Matthews; Made Wild Statements Last Night

Brother Aldermen Back Up Ald. Gillean Against an Unjust Attack.

Ald. Matthews at last night's meeting of the council made an attack upon Chairman Gillean and the members of No. 3 committee which, in the opinion of the council, with the exception of Ald. Cooper, was not only uncalled for but unjustifiable.

The rumor was prevalent around the council chamber that Ald. Matthews' attack was caused by his being jealous of the splendid showing that Ald. Gillean and his colleagues on No. 3 have made this year when they will end with a surplus amounting to \$4,000.

The trouble arose when during the discussion of No. 2's report an item regarding the estimated cost of tiling the creek on Egerton street from Mary street to Dundas street was given at \$875. It was pointed out that the work was necessary but that there was no funds with which to do it.

Perhaps we might get the amount from No. 3, said Ald. Matthews, who then said that he had taken from the people by false pretenses, sneered Ald. Matthews.

"Mr. Mayor," shouted Ald. Gillean, jumping to his feet, "I demand, in justice to myself and the members of No. 3 committee, that Ald. Matthews recall that statement."

"I will stand by my statement," said Ald. Matthews.

"That's right," said Ald. Cooper.

Some Hot Shot.

Mayor Judd: "I have no power to make Ald. Matthews retract any statement he has made."

"I will not say any more until Ald. Matthews takes that back," said Ald. Gillean.

"Then you will never speak again," retorted Ald. Matthews.

"No gentleman would make such statements," said Ald. Gillean. "The surplus this year was saved from the street watering. Matthews was chairman of the committee last year and never gave the people anything. No man, no cur, not even a dog, would say what he has said," said the chairman with withering contempt.

"It's no use Ald. Gillean getting his back up," said Ald. Cooper, "for the money does not belong to No. 3, but to the citizens."

Ald. Saunders: "Chairman Gillean would give the money to repair the tiling."

The Mayor Speaks.

Mayor Judd: "He can't, but he is very generous in giving everything."

Ald. Matthews: "Yes, even abuse."

Mayor Judd: "I cannot permit the discussion. Ald. Matthews has done No. 3 a great injustice. Ald. Cooper made a motion which was carried, that the matter be referred to next year's council, with the recommendation that the money be obtained and the work completed. Near the close of the evening his words were asked if there were any other motions."

"Yes, I have a most important one, moved by myself and seconded by Ald. Gerry," said Chairman Gillean.

"It is that," said Ald. Matthews, "draw his statement that the members 'I can't take anything back, because it's true,' said Ald. Matthews."

Belongs to Citizens.

"I can say a word about that," said Ald. Cooper, "that \$4,000 belongs to the citizens. It was taken from them for what they did not get. Ald. Gillean says the street watering was done for them, that it has been done for years. It may have been done in front of his house, but it certainly was not done in front of mine. The citizens should be given the money back. They paid for the water, and they can back it up by the contractors, who say they were only allowed to come out on certain days. Why should the people be asked to pay for what they did not get? The streets were not watered. Ald. Matthews said he did not have that surplus, Ald. Gillean," declared Ald. Cooper, "and the reason why you have that surplus is because you did not allow the contractors to do their work."

Watering Done Well.

Ald. Stevenson—No. 3 has a surplus because it did not have to pay the contractors for the water. The streets were watered, and I, for one, will say that I have heard fewer complaints this summer than ever before.

A number of aldermen went out into the afternoon at this point, among them Ald. Matthews. Mayor Judd also went out, and Ald. Beattie took the chair.

Ald. Stevenson—No. 3 has done all right, and has every reason to be proud of their work. I think Chairman Gillean should be complimented instead of censured.

Ald. Scarlett—It is a shame to say that No. 3 robbed the citizens. The chairman and his colleagues deserve every credit for the excellent manner in which they have handled the business entrusted to their care.

Charge is Unfounded.

Ald. Stevely—In attacking the chairman, Ald. Matthews attacks the committee. The charge is unfounded and the statements made should be retracted.

Ald. Booth—As a member of No. 3 I must say Chairman Gillean deserves every credit, and this abuse is absolutely uncalled for.

Ald. Garratt—No. 3 has done well, and the surplus is due to the fact that there was a great deal of rain and very few street improvements to be carried out.

Chairman Beattie—It is to be regretted that such remarks have been made, and they are most uncalled for. If you change the wording of your motion, Ald. Gillean, and say that we request Ald. Matthews to withdraw his statement, it would be better.

Ald. Matthews apparently could restrain Ald. Gillean—Some people are too well bred. No gentleman would leave the room during an affair of this kind. It shows his mean character in trying to sneak out of it.

Matthews recalls his statements or not, since I have heard the statements of my colleagues, whom I am glad to find support me in every way."

Ald. Matthews by this time had recovered himself sufficiently to talk, and remarked sarcastically:

"I ought to go to Ald. Gillean for instruction in etiquette. I know I regret that I did not do so before the meeting. He talks about me when he did worse than I did. He called me a cur."

Ald. Gillean—I never called any person such a name in my life. What I said was that no cur would make the statements that you did."

Ald. Matthews—A man who will make such statements will do anything. Here is another mark of his good breeding, interrupting the speaker. But I will stand by my statements. I pay two water rates for street watering where I live, and I am paying for what I never got. Maybe it was because the man with all the good breeding had a grudge against me. When I left the room it was to give my colleagues a chance to discuss the matter, and it doesn't matter to me whether they decide I am wrong or not. "I am going home now," he said, as he left the room. But he was back almost immediately.

Ald. Cooper—Close the discussion, Mr. Chairman. I don't want to hear any more about it.

Chairman Beattie then read the motion changing the wording so that it read: "Ald. Matthews was requested to withdraw his statements. 'All in favor,' said the chairman."

Everyone's hand went up with the exception of Ald. Cooper's, who shouted "No," emphatically.

Ald. Matthews did not take back the statement.
