CARRIED INTO RIVER IN WALKERTON FLOOD

Four Workmen Had a Very Close Call For Being Drowned.

They were only rescued by their fellow workmen after the most desperate efforts.

Mr. T. E. Godson, police magistrate of Porcupine, formerly of the bridge, to be provincial mining commissioner to succeed Mr. Price.

It was reported that the name of Mr. Price had been under consideration for the chairmanship. That the difficulty which stood in the way of his selection by the Government was the problem of choosing a successor whose practical knowledge of mining operations and conditions would enable him to enter upon Mr. Price's work.

Mr. Godson of Porcupine is under consideration as a commissioner of mining should it be decided to make Mr. Price chairman of the railway board.

BYLAW PASSED

Sullivan fled after the shooting, and has not yet been captured.
