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LONDON O.H.A. TEAMS HAVE  
BIG WEEK AHEAD OF THEM

Juniors Meet Woodstock College and Ingersoll While Intermediates Meet Paris, St. Thomas and Ingersoll.

This will be a busy week for the London O. H. A. hockey teams. The Juniors will meet the fast Woodstock College at the Princess Rink this evening, and the Intermediates will go to St. Thomas to play the return game with the Saints. On Wednesday night the Intermediates will go to Paris, in what will undoubtedly be the most crucial game of the season. The Juniors will play in Ingersoll that evening, and this game will also be an important one for London. On Friday night the Intermediates play the fast and heavy Ingersoll Intermediates in London in the final game of the district.

Thus it will be seen by the end of the week it will be known whether the London teams will be group winners or not. The Intermediates have not yet lost a game, and they stand a better show for the district title than the Juniors, who have to win from Woodstock College here tonight and also from Ingersoll on Wednesday night to tie up the playoffs.

Can They Beat Paris? On hard ice it is believed London can trim Paris on its own rink. Although the locals made a poor showing against the Green Shirts here, their playing in Ingersoll on hard ice was a revelation, and the team has mightily improved since

Paris met them. The players are confident of beating Paris, and although the underdog town aggregation is a hockey team of no mean ability on its own stamping ground, it is the opinion of many local fans that London will turn the trick in Paris on Wednesday night. The game against St. Thomas tonight is not taken seriously, it is just a question of how many goals London will get. The Saints are a nice little bunch of players, but they are not in London's class, although it is likely they will make the game interesting for the local players.

Ingersoll a Hard Team to Beat The game against Ingersoll here on Friday night is not so certain. The Ingersoll team is a hard one to beat at any stage, and on a fast sheet of ice it will give London a hard battle. After going through two strenuous games with St. Thomas and Paris, Ingersoll is liable to come here on Friday night and catch the locals all tagged out from the previous two contests. In such a case the visitors would have an even chance of winning.

The Junior team is going good just now, and a win in Ingersoll would only get a 4-to-2 win against Woodstock College in Woodstock, while London has a chance of winning.

FOR INTERCOLLEGIATE

Football Union Took No Action  
in Joe Donnelly's Case—  
New Rules Likely.

Montreal, Jan. 26.—Accepting the explanation of the McGill Club that no substantial charges of professionalism had been proved against Joe Donnelly, said to have played baseball for money in the Maritime Provinces, the Intercollegiate Football Union at its annual meeting on Saturday took no action in the matter. A committee was appointed to redraft the playing rules. The most important changes suggested are the reduction of teams to twelve men and the introduction of a ten-yard setback for a team for offside work, instead of losing the ball.

BOBBY HECK AND OUTFIELDER  
SIGN LONDON 1914 CONTRACTS

Leading Pitcher of League Last Year and  
Fast Youngster Named Rycher Gathered  
Into the Fold—Beebe Heard From.

Bobby Heck, the prize twirler of the 1913 Canadian League and the pick of the London club heavers last season, sent his signed contract to the London club this morning. Accompanying the contract was a letter from Bobby in which he stated that he was greatly satisfied with the treatment accorded him by the London club last year and trusted that they would both get on as well this coming season. He is putting in the winter in his home city, Syracuse, New York, and taking good care of himself. He is glad to note that the Canadian League has risen to Class B ball, and he believes he will be able to dish up the same kind of pitching this coming season as he did last year. The London club directors were delighted to receive the southpaw's contract.

New Outfielder Signed.  
A new outfielder, who will likely fill the vacancy left by Oleson Neal, has also been signed up. He is a youngster by the name of Rycher. He is a product of the Rochester City Baseball League and he hit over .400 in that organization this past season. He comes well recommended to the London club, and is expected that he will have little trouble in making good. He is said to be a speedy boy both in the field and on the bases.

Beebe Changes His Address.  
A letter was also received by Benton B. Beebe this morning. B. B. Beebe wanted to know why he had not received a contract. The truth of the matter is that he has changed his place of residence since last the London club heard from him, so the contract had been mailed to the wrong address. President Stevely will see that a contract is forwarded to the new address as soon as possible.

Beebe states that the Federal League has been after him, but he has not yet signed up. He does not even say he will sign up. This may be a stall or it may not be. This Federal League has provided many a ball player with a nice little stall in which to hold up the owners of the club they are with, so it will not be surprising to find that a good many of the London players who are looking for a boost on their pay sheet will mention the fact that the Federal League is camping on their trail night and day. It's a fine little yarn, anyway.

Nothing more has been heard from Eddie Linneborn, but he will likely be gathered into the fold shortly. The London club will avoid one more trouble of last season, when Linneborn held out right up until the day the season opened. The little Buffalo lad does not like the spring training idea anyway. He thinks he can get just as much training on the Buffalo parks and still hold his job. The players don't get paid for their services until the season opens, so those who hold good positions like to hang onto them just as long as possible.

Rube Deneau has returned a mask and glove to the London club which he borrowed last fall to play a couple of exhibition games. Nothing further has been done toward trading Deneau-for Coose of the Red Sox.

KIRKPATRICK SENDS  
FEDERAL CHECK BACK

Brooklyn Infielder Decides Not To Accept Offer From Outlaws, But Stay With Majors.

New York, Jan. 25.—The thousand dollars which the Federal League advanced to Enos Kirkpatrick, the Brooklyn infielder, in part payment for his year's salary as a member of the Baltimore team of the outlaw league, Kirkpatrick announced today he would return to Otto Knabe, manager of the Baltimore team, the money, but he would not return to the National League fold after it had been announced that he had quit organized baseball.

Kirkpatrick had been advised not to return the money, not with a view to keeping it permanently, but to give the National League an opportunity to get into the courts as a defendant should the Federal League sue.

CANADA AND U. S.  
TO COMPETE IN RACE

Feature of New York Meet To Be International Relay Race

New York, Jan. 26.—An international race which promises to be the feature of the indoor season has been carded by the New York Athletic club for its games in Madison Square Garden on February 11. It will be a relay race, with Canada and the United States as competitors.

Four men on a side will figure, with Meredith, the world's 800 metre and mile record holder, Mel Shepard, Homer Baker, and Tom Halpin. Canada will be represented by Jack Tressider, holder of Dominion records; George Brock, Jack Tait, and J. M. Phillips, an Englishman who has shown himself to be a flier. Tressider is the 440 yard and 880 yard champion of Canada.

San Francisco, Jan. 25.—Willie Ritchie, lightweight champion, when shown the dispatch from Chicago of an offer to be matched with Ad Wolgast early in March at Milwaukee, said that he had received a letter from Wolgast's manager offering him a ten-round bout, but had not accepted.
