The constitution of the advisory council of education is to be changed, and hereafter all members of school boards will have to subscribe to a declaration of office.

Where it is not possible to secure a qualified board, the department is empowered to appoint one.

Nurses Made Optional.

The appointment of school nurses is to be made optional with boards. The restriction against admission to industrial schools is to be lowered, and hereafter the Government grant will be paid entirely to the school board and control of the department of school boards.
