BURGLARS DESTROY
MAIN WATERFORD
BUSINESS BLOCK

Loss Is Conservatively Estimated at \$45,000 to \$50,000.

SIMCOE, Oct. 26.—Miscreants first robbed the stores of H. A. Sanderson and Col. Isaac T. York, and then caused a fire that wiped out these places of business as well as several others in Waterford early this morning. No clue to the perpetrators has yet been found, according to inquiries made in Waterford tonight, twelve hours after the blaze had been got under control. That the robbers set the fire is established to the satisfaction of the Waterford citizens, as some goods from both the shops of Sanderson and York were found this morning under the steps in front of the Teeter Hotel, a few doors west of the scene of the fire. The stores destroyed were all in the block owned by Col. I. T. York, and a conservative estimate would place the loss at from \$45,000 to \$50,000. It was impossible to discover the insurance carried.

Many Are Losers.
H. A. Sanderson was the proprietor of a general store, with a stock valued at possibly \$10,000. Col. York, who had a drug shop and hardware business, probably lost \$15,000 worth of goods. Other losers are H. K. Robinson, a jeweler, whose stock would be appraised at \$7,000; Miss Wilson lost her entire line of millinery, and its cash equivalent would be perhaps \$1,000, and Capt. George Wilcox of the Canadian Dental Corps, whose equipment and furniture went up in smoke.

WRITES OF CAPTURE
OF SEVENTY GERMANS

United States Cannot
Keep Out of Another

He gave as his reason his belief that "the business of neutrality is over," and that "war now has such a scale that the position of neutrals sooner or later become intolerable."

NORTH OXFORD LIBS.
OPPOSE EXTENDING
PARLIAMENT'S TERM

Opinion Almost Unanimous at Kintore Meeting.

WOODSTOCK, Oct. 26.—E. W. Nesbitt, M. P. for North Oxford, addressed a large meeting of his constituents at Kintore, where he discussed some of the more important issues of the day.

He severely criticized the Government for its extravagance in the matter of military expenditures, and for its laxity in the matter of the nickel industry. He asked for an expression of opinion from the meeting as to the advisability of extending the parliamentary term, and the word was almost generally expressed that in view of the unsatisfactory representation as a result of the last redistribution, such a course would be unwise.

Mr. Nesbitt also touched on the railway situation, and gave it as his opinion that Government control of the railways would be neither practicable nor wise at the present time.

Donald Sutherland Returning.
Lieut.-Col. Donald Sutherland, who was wounded while he was serving with the first contingent, and a second time while in command of a Montreal battalion, to which he was transferred after going to England in command of the 71st, left England October 17 for Canada, according to an official message received at Norwich by his mother from Ottawa today.

Banquet Returned Elks.
The local Elks' lodge last night gave a successful banquet in honor of three of its members, Capt. McLeay, McKay and Jupp, all of whom have returned after serving with the Medical, either in England, or in France. Capt. McLeay served as a medical officer with an imperial regiment, and was through several hot engagements, being wounded while attending wounded members of a unit in a dugout. Capt. McKay and Jupp were with the C. A. M. C.

Carl O'Neill presented a leather rocker. Games and dancing were enjoyed.

TWO KINCARDINE MEN

ARE KILLED IN ACTION

KINCARDINE, Oct. 26.—Official word was received this morning that Corp. Burton Stewart, 26, son of the late James McK. Stewart, and brother of R. J. Stewart, barrister, Kincardine, has been killed in action in France during the Somme campaign. He is the date of his fall. Corp. Stewart enlisted with the 13th Battalion from here two years ago, Oct. 28, and he had been in the trenches continuously for a year. He was 20 years of age. His mother and only sister reside in Toronto. His remaining brother, Edward Stewart, is now in action at the front with a Western battalion.

INCLUDE 3 WOUNDED

KINCARDINE, Oct. 26.—Mrs. E. G. Anderson, who resides with her father, R. M. Fraser, received word that her husband, Pte. E. G. Anderson, was wounded October 12, while fighting in France. This is the second time Pte. Anderson has been wounded.

Pte. Burton Stewart has been missing since the 15th of September last, and his family have no further word of him. His mother, Mrs. J. M. K. Stewart, and his brother, R. J. Stewart of this town, have endeavored to get authentic information, but their efforts have been unrewarded. Burton was a well-known athlete, and previous to joining the forces he won his commission on the field and was highly thought of by his men and superior officers. He is at present in England. His father received notice that he was wounded in the back and face.

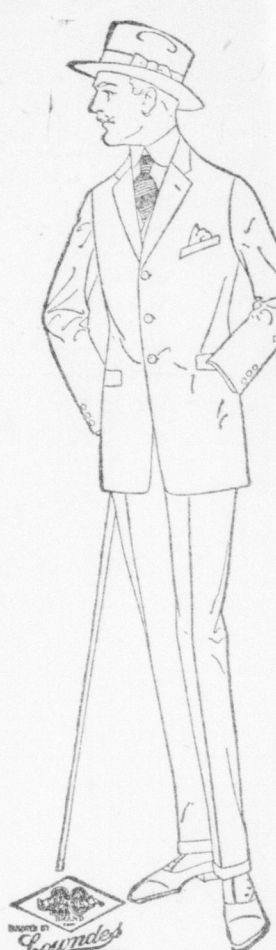

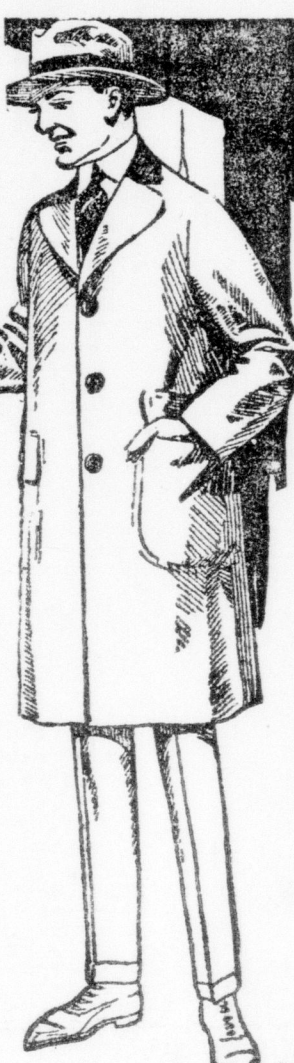
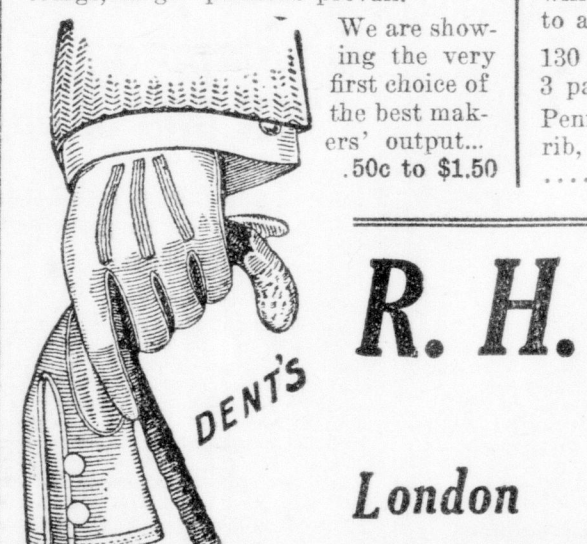
