Thomas Adams, town planning adviser for the Dominion Government, met the members of the industrial comemendments to the town planning and development act of Ontario. The federal representative was able to advise the local men as to what changes would properly the local men as to what changes would be of most benefit to the cities, and a number of his suggestions were considered adaptable in town planning for this city.

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—Five witnesses, all pioneer residents of Ottawa, whose combined ages total 445 years, were called by the city in their actions against the Grand Trunk Railway, and the Ottawa and New York Railway, and the Ottawa and New York Railway, for unpaid assessments on improvements made to part of Nicholas street.

The action opened before Justice Lennox in the supreme court of Ontario this morning. The five pioneers are: John R. Booth, aged 94; Michael O'Brien, aged 96: John Lyttle, aged, 88; J. L. They were called to determine whether the portion of Nicholas street, known at Hurdman's Bridge, was in use as a public highway prior to, and since the railway tracks were extended down the east bank of the Rideau Canal. The only one heard this morning was J. R. Booth, the well-known lumberman. In spite of his advanced years, Mr. Booth was able to give clear and concise answers to Mr. F. B. Proctor, city selicitor.

BOOK CENSORSHIP

HAS BEEN REMOVED OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—(Canadian Press.)
—The censorship on books and literature generally, which was in operation during the war period and until a short time ago, has been removed. The question having arisen as to whether the removal of restriction with regard to newspapers also applied to books, Col. Ernest Chambers, formerly chief press censor for Canada, was consulted. His reply was that there was no longer any censorship on books and such classes of literature. He explained that the postoffice and customs departments had the authority to prohibit entry of literature which in any way contravened the criminal code just as before the war, but all-other censorship regulations are off. 

## NO DECORATION FOR NAVAL OFFICERS WHO LOST THEIR SHIPS

Unless They Attacked Enemy, Not Deserved, Says U. S. Board.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The Knight board is unable to agree with Secretary Daniels that naval officers who lost their ships through enemy submarine action and performed meritorious service in connection with such loss should be awarded high decorations, according to Rear Admiral Knight, chairman of the board.

Admiral Knight said a high decora-Admiral Knight said a high decoration was not deserved unless the sinking was accompanied by offensive action against the enemy. He said that in the case of the commander, D. W. Bagley, Secretary Daniels' brother-inlaw, no decoration was recommended for any circumstance in connection with the sinking of the destroyer Jacob Jones, because Commander Bagley did not engage the enemy.
