EVIDENCE SHOWS WILL BUILD HOMES FLOOD CAUSED TYPHOID FEVER

Contamination of the Ontario Hospital Wells by Recent Downpour Blamed.

NO CAUSE FOR ALARM

Using City Water Now—The Situation Is Well in Hand.

That the typhoid fever epidemic, prevalent in the Ontario Hospital here, is due to contamination of the drinking water supply of that institution during the July flood, is the opinion of Dr. W. J. Robinson, medical superintendent. "The typhoid fever was due to flooding of our wells in the flood last July," he informed The Advertiser this afternoon. "Our reservoir was flooded, and as soon as we discovered that the water was not pure we shut it off, and are now using city water, as we will never use those wells again, as we intend to sink new artesian wells here."

"While the epidemic is serious there is no cause for alarm. However, the situation is serious and means much more work for us. We had two or three more cases reported Thursday, but every one of the patients is doing well and we are fixing them up fine."

"We had one death Wednesday, but that was an epileptic case, and typhoid fever may not have been the cause of death. We are coping with the situation and everything is going as well as can be expected."

HUGHES AND MASSEY NEGOTIATING FOR TRADE AGREEMENTS

London, Aug. 12.—By the Canadian Press.—The Morning Post says it understands that Premier Hughes of Australia and Premier Massey of New Zealand are engaged in important negotiations with French and Belgian customs representatives in London with a view to the establishment of reciprocal or preferential customs duties, agreements relating to raw materials on the one hand, and manufactured goods on the other.

Another purpose of the discussions is in regard to stabilizing the rates of exchange between France and Belgium and the British dominions in the Antipodes.

City Briefs

TAKES OUT PERMIT.—John Glenn has taken out a building permit for a 1½-story brick veneer dwelling on the Wortley road, at \$5,100.

L. P. CONFERENCE.—At 10 o'clock Saturday morning the executive of the Independent Labor Party will meet in conference at Toronto with the Labor members of the Provincial House. Unemployment will be the chief discussion. H. B. Ashplant is the local member of this committee.

SPECIAL TRAIN FOR BLACK KNIGHTS.—A special train made up of five coaches was run to Stratford over the G. T. R. this morning at 10 o'clock to accommodate the Orangemen and their friends from London and St. Thomas participating in the Royal Black Knights' Derry Day celebration held there today.

WRITE EXAMS. NEXT WEEK.—Civil instructors to the number of 75, who for the past six weeks have been undergoing training at Carleton Place, will conclude the course of instruction on Friday, August 19. Beginning Monday, August 15, they will write on a number of examinations pertaining to military work, finishing up on the following Friday.

CONDITION IS IMPROVED.—Although still in a rather precarious condition, Thomas Jones, of the firm of Cowan's Hardware Company, is today reported to be slightly improved. Jones was stricken by paralysis in May last, and has been confined to his bed since that time.

MUSKETRY COURSE FOR R. C. R.—A company of this R. C. R. Battalion will go to the Cove ranges on Monday, where they will undergo a course of instruction in musketry for a month before returning to regular routine at the camp. The course, under the direction of Lieut.-Col. Langford, of the R. C. R., will consist of lectures, long range shooting and general musketry.

ANOTHER PROVINCIAL OFFER.—Frank Jones was sworn in this morning by Spire W. H. Chittick and Capt. T. E. Robinson at the court house as a special constable for the month of August.

GUEST OF LIONS CLUB.—Hon. E. C. Drury, premier of Ontario, upon his arrival in London on Labor Day, is scheduled to dine at the Lions' Club. After addressing the unions' gathering at Queen's Park the leader of the Ontario administration will journey to Lakeside, in North Oxford. He will be accompanied by Dr. Hugh Stevenson, M. P. for London.

WILL ACT PART OF FOSTER.—FATHER.—J. H. Foster has been appointed chairman of the special committee of the Lions' Club which is appointed to entertain the children of all the orphanages of the city to a day at the Western Fair, Monday, September 12, has been selected as a date for the treat, and a record day is anticipated for the youngsters.

DOG ON A RAMPA.—Residents on Emery street, between Wharncliffe road and Edward street, are in a state of alarm because of a dog. Last night the dog is alleged to have killed a number of valuable rabbits and destroyed a number of gardens. "A police officer is located," stated one of the residents, who suffered considerable loss.

BUILDING PERMITS.—Mrs. Muesel, a burner of this city, has taken out a building permit to construct a one-story brick veneer addition to a dwelling at 21 Akin street at an estimated cost of \$2,300. J. Westman has received a permit to build a 1½-story east to cost \$3,500. Building permits issued here this month now total \$56,000.

CONTRACTS ARE AWARDED.—Sawyer, W. A. Tanner of the board of education announced today that contracts have been awarded for furniture for additional rooms in Wortley Road, Tecumseh, Knollwood Park and Belling School. This furniture, which includes 42 desks and 42 chairs for auxiliary classes, and which will cost approximately \$2,000, is to be delivered before public school opens on September 1.

AUCTION OF CITY HOUSES.—An auction sale of three brick cottages, two of which are Queen's avenue and one on Lorne avenue, which are to be removed to make way for an extension of Woodman avenue between these two thoroughfares, will be conducted for the city of London by C. N. Cooper on Saturday at 4 p.m. The dwellings can be removed or dismantled according to the wishes of the purchasers. They are used as a street, and the sale will be conducted on the premises.

MUST PAY OR GO TO JAIL.—Bert Grazer, who was brought to the police court this morning by his wife because he had not made the weekly payments to her ordered by the court when he was convicted of a breach of the wives' maintenance act, was told by the court that if he did not settle within a week he would find himself in jail. His wife stated that he had only paid her \$5 since June. She is at present living with her parents. Grazer admitted that he had been paying \$3 a week for his own board. Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon told him that his first consideration should be his wife and baby.

E. LEONARD & SONS' ANNUAL PICNIC.—Kingsbank Park will be the scene of the annual outing of the employees of E. Leonard & Sons, engine and boiler manufacturers, York street. An interesting program of sports and amusements has been arranged by the committee, and a generous prize list prepared. Gifts donated by Mrs. F. E. Leonard, Miss Alice Leonard, Mrs. W. C. Leonard, and Mrs. J. C. McKillop are in the hands of the committee. The picnic is certain to be well contested. A highland fling dancing competition, for which gold and silver medals will be presented to the winners, is included in the program. The oldest employee and the possessor of the largest family on the grounds also come within the prize list.

London Morning Post Says Unionists' Future Not Very Clear.

London, Aug. 12.—Canadian Press.—The statement that Andrew Brown, law, was returning to London shortly to resume the Unionist leadership in the House of Commons was decisively denied here today.

The original statement was accompanied by a suggestion that the Unionists were restless under the leadership of Austen Chamberlain. The London Times insists that the desire for Brown to return is increased by the probability of a general election within measurable distance. The Times adds that the Unionist party is now disunited, with regions taking their own course on matters of vital moment to the Government. The Morning Post, supporting the denial, says that nobody knowing Mr. Law would dream of asking him to supersede Austen Chamberlain. The Post admits that the party's future is not very clear unless it definitely breaks from the Coalition Government.

WILL BAR MEN CLERKS.

Havana, Aug. 12.—An amendment to the immigration law now being considered by the Senate, prohibits the employment of men as clerks in shops devoted to the sale of women's articles of apparel.

PRISONERS AS "WHITE WINGS."

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HIKER FORCED TO RETURN DUE TO WIFE'S ILLNESS

Windsor, Aug. 12.—R. G. Siegel, walking hiker from Hamilton to San Francisco, arrived in Windsor yesterday afternoon to learn that his wife in Hamilton had taken suddenly ill. As he wanted to get back in a hurry and was without funds, he appealed to the city clerk's office for aid and was given a railway ticket. Siegel stated that he was just tramping from Hamilton to the western city as a pastime.

KILLED PREACHER FOR MARRYING DAUGHTER TO MAN THAT HE DISLIKED

Birmingham, Ala., Aug. 12.—Edwin R. Stephenson, a barber and itinerant preacher, who yesterday shot and killed Rev. James E. Coyle, pastor of St. Paul's Church, had little to say today regarding the shooting.

"I remonstrated with him for marrying my daughter Ruth to a man against whom we had lodged objections," said the prisoner. "I called him a dirty dog." He struck me and I shot him." Father Coyle was shot on the porch of St. Paul's rectory and died in a hospital without regaining consciousness.

LITTLE GIRL DIES IN AN EFFORT TO SAVE HER SISTER

Daughters of Frank Dennis of Wallaceburg Victims of Birthday Accident.

Chatham, Aug. 12.—Two daughters, aged 5 and 9 years, of Frank Dennis, Wallaceburg, were drowned in Run-ning Creek north of the town, late yesterday afternoon, during the progress of a birthday party in honor of the younger victim. Several tons of lumber were piled up on the bank, and the older daughter, in an effort to rescue her sister, fell into the stream. The bodies were recovered in 30 minutes.

COURTS ARE LENIENT TO THREE LONDONERS

Men Convicted On Theft Charges Are Given Another Chance.

Three Londoners were allowed to go on suspended sentence in London today after they had been convicted of theft. They were Alfred Pradgely and Albert Black, who appeared in police court before Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon, and Norman Bates, who appeared in the county court before Judge Talbot Macbeth.

Pradgely was convicted a month ago of stealing lumber from Tecumseh Barracks and bailed to appear today. As this crime was the first stain on his character, which had been good, and exceptionally so while he was at the barracks, he was given a chance for if he was ever suspected of doing wrong he could be brought before the court and sentenced.

Given a Chance.

Black had been convicted of two thefts of tools from the People's Garage, and in order to commit one, broke into the garage. As his dependants would suffer, the court decided to give him a chance. He said that he could obtain work in a nearby town. He was bailed in the sum of \$200 to appear when called and instructed to write to the chief of police from time to time telling of his actions and his whereabouts.

Must Report to Sheriff.

Norman Bates, aged 17, was convicted by Judge Macbeth of stealing a bicycle from John A. Holden, of Nussong, was arrested here on Monday, having taken the bicycle to ride home and intended to return it the following morning, but the fact that he admitted that he took 50 cents from the owner, the bicycle, which was a 1910 model, was returned to their respective owners.

THOMAS ADAMS VISITS LONDON COMMISSION

Dominion Town Planner Addresses Meeting Here Today.

Thomas Adams, of Ottawa, town planner for the Dominion of Canada, addressed members of the Town Planning Commission during luncheon held at the Tecumseh Hotel this afternoon. The meeting of the commission, which was held in session at the hotel, was presided over by Mr. Adams, who discussed the local situation with the commission in an informal way and urged that plans of London be prepared with public buildings, parks and open spaces, school grounds and other buildings marked, each on separate maps.

Another map should be prepared he declared, with assessment values of the city marked thereon, each value being designated by a distinctive color. These maps are known to the Dominion planning commission, and the preliminary studies. After his talk members of the commission discussed ways and means of improving the local situation with particular reference to the city of London.

Mr. Adams' visit to this city was unexpected, his meeting being held while he was en route to London for the town planning commission at its last meeting here decided to postpone his return to London until September or late August.
