

Sackville, N.B., Sept. 3 .- The "forward movement' of the United church of Canada, launched at the conference of the general council some time ago, was the subject of an address by Rev. Dr. George C. All the denominations in the land, said Dr. Pidgeon, had been concerned with secondary matters, creating divisions which had handicapped and crippled the church, The United church, he said, catholic enough to embrace in its
