CANADIAN MINERALS.

A summary statement of the mineral production of Canada for the year 1893 has just been issued from the Geological Survey Department. It shows a total value of \$19.

Z50,000, this being a quarter of a million less than that recorded for 1892, and a million and a quarter less than the total for 1891, but very largely in excess of the returns for the years preceding. Metallic minerals to the value of \$4,582,166, are in-duded in the stated total, these in the order of their importance being: Nickel, \$2,076.

351; gold, \$927,244; copper, \$875,864; allver, \$321,423; iron ore. \$288,018; lead, \$80,996; platinum, \$1,800 and zinc \$470. The non-metallic minerals were valued at \$14,391,291, coal leading with \$8,422,259, and the next in order of the diversified list being; Petroleum, \$834, 334; natural gas, \$366,233; anbestas, \$313,806; aypsum, \$196,150; sair, \$195,926; pyrites, \$175,626; and mineral water \$108,347. The value of structural minerals, included in the non-metallic total, was about \$3,500,000, these being only estimated, and the chief thus placed. Bricks, \$
