Mackintosh Jollied

Banquet at Rosland a Proud Event for the Ex-Lieutenant Governor.

Tribute for Brilliant Services Rendered by His Tongue and Pen.

The "Cool Rhodes of Canada"

One of His Colleagues' Description.

Rosland, June 20.—To-night the citizens of Rosland tendered a banquet to Mr. C. H. Mackintosh on his return from Europe. Distinguished citizens of the United States, ex-cabinet ministers of the Dominion, the Attorney-General of British Columbia, and Mr. Eberts, the ex-attorney-general of the province, as well as judges, jurists and bankers were present to do honor to the guest, and the banquet proved a magnificent occasion to Mr. Mackintosh, given in recognition of the services which he has rendered to the mining interests of British Columbia.

Attorney-General Martin voiced the sentiments of the assemblage when he declared that the financial world knew nothing of the mineral wealth of Canada till the genius of Governor Mackintosh blazoned forth in a manner and in language that captured the attention of the world.

Judge Heyburn, the celebrated American jurist, declared in the course of his oration that Governor Mackintosh had done more to effect a union of hearts between the British Empire and the United States than all the statesmen of two continents. He also pointed out the interests and ambitions were identical.

General Warren, speaking for Americans, declared that the United States envied Canada the possession of a son so illustrious as Mr. Mackintosh.

Ross Thompson, the founder of Rosland, and Mayor Goodeve added roars for the guest of the evening.

General Warren, in his speech, in enthusiastic terms of the ex-Governor's great services in bringing to the attention of the world the mineral wealth of the province, and the Le Roi and Omineca and Kootenay.
