UNIVERSITY AFFAIRS.

Meeting of the Senate—Admission of the Baptist and Wesleyan Colleges.

A meeting of the senate of Toronto university was held yesterday afternoon. There were present: Dr. Wilson, B. E. Kingsford, Dr. McFarlane, John King, Prof. Loudon, Dr. Caven, Charles, Moss, Wm. Houston, Prof. Galbraith, W. A. Foster and Dr. Oldright.

A petition was read from the Toronto Baptist college, asking for affiliation with the university. It referred to a committee, Prof. Loudon presented the report of the committee on the affiliation of Wesleyan college. The report recommended affiliation and was adopted on motion of Prof. Loudon, seconded by Dr. Caven, Mr. Kingsford dissenting.

The report of the boards of arts and legal studies prescribing work for 1st year in law (1885 to 1890) was presented and adopted.

Dr. McFarlane presented the report of the board of medical studies relative to new curriculum. The report recommended the re-estabishment of the primary and final examinations, and was adopted.

A report from Upper Canada college, which recommended the appointment of W. H. Fraser, M.A., as French and German master was adopted. The committee on examinations presented their report, which was adopted in its entirety. It recommended that Mr. Squair's absence C. Whitham be examiner on French for matriculation and supplementary examinations.

Mr. Houston's minority report relative to the department of political science was read. On motion of Prof. Loudon a statute affiliating Wesleyan college received its first reading. On motion of Mr. Kingsford, the committee of last year appointed for the purpose of consolidating the statutes was re-appointed.
