BOSANQUET COUNCIL.

Council met on the 6th inst. All the members present. Minutes of the last meeting read and confirmed.

The following orders were given:—

Lougheed—Melville: John Campbell \$75 for assessing and \$2 for postage, G. Sutherland, \$730 to pay customs duties and express for road scraper, \$16 to pay the Austin Co for two blades for grader, \$6.75 postage and express, \$5.30 for serving subpoenas and witness fees in suit of Watson vs. Bosanquet, and \$100 on salary; Cowan & Towers \$15 for probating the estate of the late F. Quantz and \$125, the township's expenses in suit Watson vs. Bosanquet, H. Russell \$130, expenses to Sarnia in this suit.

McIntyre—Sitter: Fred Jennings \$11.50 for horse hurt and wagon spring broken on 2nd con., Wm. Randall \$1 for buggy damaged on 2nd con.

Sitter—McIntyre: In favor of John Dallas for \$4 for winter road across his field.

By-laws were passed, taking the lands of Caleb Travis from road beat No. 82 and placing them in beat 81 and appropriating a further sum of \$400 for roads

and bridges.
An application was received from Ira Brooks, H. Goldsmith and others to have the Russell drain repaired and the Clerk was instructed to notify the Engineer.
Mr. Parkinson reported to the Council that the river is washing away its banks at Port Frank and that unless some action is taken it may destroy the village.
Lougheed—McIntyre, that the Reeve and Mr. Melville made investigations as to the river washing away the sand at Port Frank with power to act.
Mr. Powell proposed to give the council a new road across his lot, 35, L.R., in lieu of revision on the assessment roll and at 1 p.m. for general business.

The Control of Insect Pests in Canada.

The Division of Entomology of the Experimental Farms Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has recently issued a bulletin by Dr. C. Gordon Hewitt, Dominion Entomologist, on "The Control of Insect Pests in Canada."

An account is given of the history of the war against insect pests in Canada and of the manner in which insect pests have invaded the country. It has been gradually opened up and cultivated. The manner in which the Dominion and Provincial governments are endeavoring by legislation and other means to prevent the introduction of insect pests into Canada and the increase and spread of those pests already here is described. An interesting summary of the various lines of work undertaken and carried on by the Division of Entomology at Ottawa is given and the general public will no doubt be surprised at the many problems that come within the scope of the entomologists who are called upon to deal with insects in their relations to all the varied activities of man; insects affecting farm crops, fruit growing, forest and shade trees; insects attacking man's possessions and infesting houses, attacking domestic animals and finally affecting the health of man. All insects, however, are not injurious and the work of the Entomologist includes bees and bee-keeping and the study of parasitic and other enemies which may be of assistance in obtaining control of insect pests.
