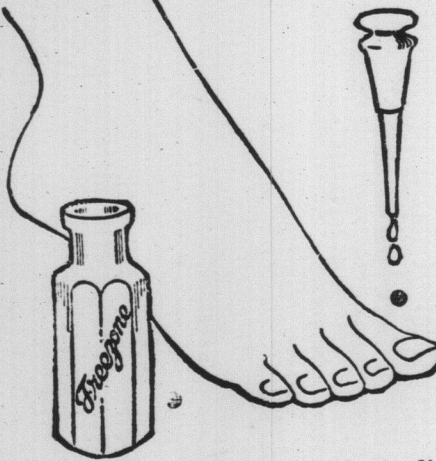

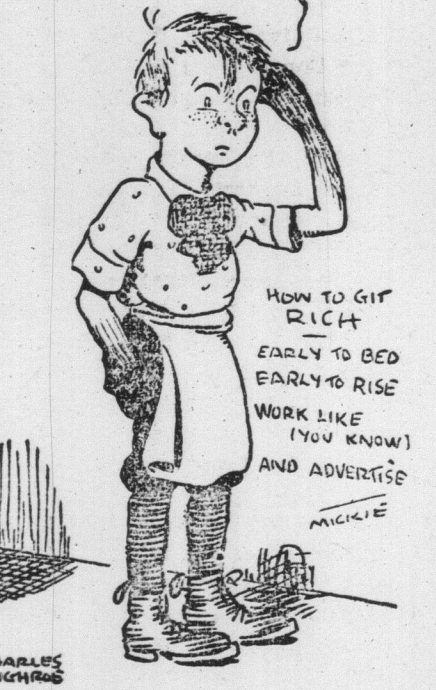
The sale has added interest on account of its completing the disposal of the extensive farms of the late Howard Bligh, which a few years ago formed one of the largest country estates in the province.
