Scientific and Useful.

TO CLEAN TIN.—The best thing for cleaning tin-ware is common soda; dampen a cloth, dip in soda, rub the ware briskly, after which, wipe dry.

MINUTE LEAF CAKE.—Three cups of flour, a cup and a half of sugar, half-cup of butter, cup of raisins, nutmeg, and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder.

OUR BOY.—The welfare of our boy is one of our greatest and first considerations. Then why let him wear a shabby ulster when he can get a good-fitting, well-made garment for very little money during the big sale of boys' overcoats, commencing to-morrow at Peileys'.

PUTTING OUT A FIRE.—Extinguish the fire in a burning chimney by first shutting the doors of the room, then throw on the fire in the fire-place a few handfuls of common fine salt. Close the fireplace and allow the muriatic acid gas evolved from the burning salt to pass up the chimney and put out the fire.

SPICE CAKE.—To make a very good spice cake take three pounds of seedless raisins, one and a half pounds of citron, two and a half coffee-cups of sugar, two cups of sweet milk, four cups of flour, six eggs, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, three teaspoonfuls of cinnamon and two of mace. Keep in tins until a day or two before it is wanted, and then put it into an earthen jar.

RICE WAFFLES.—Boiled rice, one cup; eggs, three; butter one ounce; sour milk, two cups; salt and soda, one teaspoonful each. Stir the rice to separate the grains well; add the butter creamed, and the eggs frothed; dissolve the soda, stir into the milk; add to the mixture with flour enough to make a batter, rather thick; heat the waffle irons and rub well with butter; fill three-quarters only, and bake carefully.

JUDY PIE.—Chop the meat of a boiled chicken very fine, then cut the liver in thin slices, put a layer of the minced chicken in the bottom of a pudding-dish, then lay the liver over it, then the rest of the chicken should be put in with plenty of salt, pepper and butter. Make a little nice gravy of the chicken broth, pour this over the chicken, over the top put a crust of not too rich paste. Bake a delicate brown.

PUDDING.—A simple but good pudding is made of one cup of sweet milk, one-half teaspoonful of soda dissolved in a little hot water, three well beaten eggs, two table-spoonfuls of flour rubbed smooth in cold milk, half a tea cupful of chopped citron. Pour this into a pudding-dish, tie a cloth over the top and put it in a kettle of boiling water and let it boil for one hour and a half. This is best served with a fruit sauce.

ABOUT VEAL.—"My only objection to veal," said a gentleman at our table the other day, "is that it is too premature." This remark might apply to the usual manner of cooking it, as well as to the meat itself. Veal steak, in order to be palatable, must be cooked thoroughly, no matter how much haste the cook is in; this should never be sent to the table till it is nicely browned, edges and all. Salt and butter and a decided sprinkling of black pepper are also necessary.
