The Chief Justice then summed up in a very tempersist speech; and the jury retired. After being locked in for two or three hours, they came into Court sand the foreman having stated that there was no prospect of their coming to an agreement, the Chief Justice forthwith discharged them without a verdict; On the result becoming known, the crowds in andiquiside the Court cheered vocaferously.

The trial of Father Ryan was then fixed to take place on the following Morday, but on that morning Mr. O'Hagan applied for a postponement till next term, on the ground of the absence of a material witness. The Attorney-General having consented, the trial was accordingly ordered to stand over.
