

The CHAIRMAN: The rest of the items in the resolution.

Mr. SPENCER: In reference to the item of \$1,000 "grant to Alpine Club of Canada"—I should like to know why this grant is made, and what the government get out of it?

Mr. STEWART (Argenteuil): The Alpine Club is regarded as a very important organization, and I think perhaps the government gets full value for the grant through the advertising received. The club's report of its annual outings and what occurs at its camps, with the pictures of the scenic beauties in which the camps are located, and the accounts

of the club's mountain climbing, is now distributed in most of the countries from which we get tourist traffic. Throughout the United States and Great Britain you will find copies of the report which is issued annually, and I am bound to think that the thousand dollars brings very fair results in that way.

The CHAIRMAN: The items are carried with the exceptions of the vote for Canadian National Parks.
