QUEBEC-REPORTED DELAY IN CLEARANCE OF MONTREAL-BOUND PASSENGERS

On the orders of the day:

Hon. Lionel Chevrier (Laurier): I wish to address a question to the Minister of Citizenship and Immigration and ask her whether a firm decision has been taken by the department in connection with the inconvenience and delay which is alleged in a report in the Montreal press, due to customs clearance at Quebec of passengers bound for Montreal.

Hon. Ellen L. Fairclough (Minister of Citihe did not mean to say "customs clearance".

Mr. Chevrier: I am sorry; I meant in connection with immigration.

Mrs. Fairclough: I am afraid I cannot give a satisfactory answer to that question at the moment. The co-operation of the companies concerned has been sought, but I have no information other than what I read in the morning papers.

Mr. Chevrier: Has the department taken a decision as to whether it will be necessary to delay passengers bound for Montreal for a period of eight to ten hours at Quebec?

Mrs. Fairclough: There is no indication that there will be any such delay.

[Later:]

Mr. Chevrier: I wish to direct a supplementary question to the Minister of Citizenship and Immigration. Will there be undue delay at the immigration offices in Quebec to passengers bound for Montreal, following the opening of navigation?

Mrs. Fairclough: That is a difficult question to answer. It depends on what is meant by delay, taking into consideration the length of time it has taken under another system and what it would now take to examine these passengers elsewhere, and so on. do not think I can give a specific answer.

Mr. Chevrier: I think that is a reasonable reply, but could I ask the minister to make a statement on this matter when she has further information in connection with it?

Mrs. Fairclough: I shall be very glad to do that.
